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## **INTRODUCTION**



Three hundred and ten students are currently enrolled in the regular academic programmes offered by the college and fourteen students are pursuing their doctoral studies. Viva voce of two of the doctoral scholars was completed while the Vivavoce of one PhD scholar was scheduled on 29<sup>th</sup> April 2022.

# **SHORT TERM COURSES**

One hundred and Seventy-four students were enrolled across the seven short-term courses (three graduate and four postgraduate) offered at the Churchgate campus. The undergraduate courses included the Certificate Course in Peace Education (21 students), the Diploma in Social Work (23 students), and the Certificate Course in Legal Skills in Social Work Practice (30 students). The postgraduate courses included the Postgraduate Diploma in Therapeutic Counselling (39 students), PostgraduateDiploma in Child Rights and Child Protection (23 students); Postgraduate Diploma in Sustainable Development (17 students) and a Certificate Course in Advanced Social Research Methodology (21 students).

#### Brief details of the courses

Considering the pandemic situation, the short-term courses were conducted online. These courses commenced from July 2021 onwards. Courses being offered online facilitated greater enrollment of candidates all over India specifically from Delhi, Karnataka, Mizoram, West Bengal and Maharashtra – Wardha, Nasik, and Pune.

**Diploma in Social Work:** Twenty-three students had enrolled for the course and classes and Fieldwork were conducted online. Various innovative and participative teaching-learning pedagogies were used during the classes by all the course teachers. Fieldwork is an integral component of the Diploma course and every student completed 15 days of block Fieldwork. Field Placements included Karunya Trust, Sakhya-Women Guidance Cell, Department of Women and Child Development and Akanksha Foundation.

# P.G. Diploma in Therapeutic Counseling

Thirty-nine students enrolled for the course. Counselling skills, and mental health concerns at different age groups; orientation on different therapies while working with varied groups; workshops on sexual violence against women and children were offered as part of the course. As the skill-based component of counselling is integral to the course, students were provided exposure to counselling services at Children's Home, De-addiction Centre, Hospital settings, and so on for the one-month field practicum.

## Advanced Certificate Course in Social Research Methodology

Twenty-one students enrolled for the course. Topics such as Social Research Theory, Quantitative and Qualitative Research, Statistics and SPSS were offered through the course.

#### P.G. Diploma in Child Rights and Child Protection

Twenty-three students enrolled for the course. The course units included rights related to children, Child Labour, the right to Education, laws related to trafficking, child-centred practice, skills and techniques and therapeutic interventions with children. For the 15-day block Fieldwork students were placed in child rights and child care institutions such as Pratham, Department of Women and Child Development, and Vidhayak Bharti.

## P.G. Diploma in Sustainable Development

P.G. Diploma in Sustainable Development is a cobranded programme in collaboration with multiple partner agencies namely UNESCO and Cardinal Paul Poupard Foundation Chair at St. Andrew's College (who also fund the programme); Institute of Indian Culture and College of

Social Work. Seventeen students were enrolled for this course. Some of the topics covered in the Diploma include 'water, governance and development'; water and sustainability in religions and cultures; sustainable development and alternative energy".

#### RUSA sponsored Certificate Course in Legal Skills in Social Work Practice

Thirty students had enrolled for the course, most of them field practitioners in various social work organizations. The topics covered in this programme were centered on legal rights and advocacy related to children, women, the aged, Cr.P.C., environmental laws and seeking justice through legal remedies. Students enrolled for the course had to complete assignments and presentations on a legal issue.

#### **RUSA sponsored Certificate Course in Peace Education**

Twenty-one students had enrolled for the Certificate Course in Peace Education. The units covered through the course included peace-building initiatives in the context of global, national and regional political crises. Field visits, assignments and presentations were also important components of the course.

# SHORT-TERM PROGRAMMES, GOREGAON CAMPUS

#### Syllabus Revision of the Extension Centre Programs/ Courses

The curriculum of all the short-term programs and courses of the Extension Centre was revised in June 2021 by the Outcome-Based Education Framework. The purpose of a Learning Outcome-Based Curriculum Framework was to redefine the paradigm from a teacher-centric (sage on stage) to a learner-centric (guide by side) approach. The UGC introduced this to bring significant improvement in the quality of higher education in India.

Accordingly, the Syllabus Revision Committee, Extension Centre has prepared a curriculum for the academic year 2021-2026, further edited and approved by the Board of Studies of the College and Academic Council. The revised syllabus was applied to some of the courses of the Extension Centre. As a result, there is a change in the nomenclature of some of the courses:

- Certificate in Social Work for Para Professionals as Certificate in Para Social Work
- Certificate in Basic Skills in Counselling as Certificate in Para Counselling
- Certificate in Social Work for Senior Citizens as Skill-Based Course in Social Work for Senior Citizens

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# Syllabus Revision of the Extension Centre Programs/ Courses

The curriculum of all the short-term courses and programmes offered at the Extension Center was revised in June 2021 as per the Outcome-Based Education Framework. The purpose of a Learning Outcome-Based Curriculum Framework was to redefine the paradigm from a teacher-centric (sage on stage) to a learner-centric (guide by side) approach. The UGC introduced the Learning Outcome-Based Curriculum to promote significant improvements in the quality of higher education in India. Accordingly, the syllabus Revision Committee reviewed the syllabus as per the UGC Framework, further approved and edited by the Board of Studies of the College and the Academic Council. As an outcome of the syllabus revision, the nomenclature of some of the courses was changed: The Certificate in Social Work For Paraprofessionals was titled Certificate in Para Social Work. The Certificate in Basic Skills in Counselling was titled as Certificate in Para Counselling. The Certificate in Social Work For Senior Citizens was called the Skill-Based Course in Social Work For Senior Citizens and the Certificate in Management of Non-Profit Organizations was called the Skill-Based Course in Management For Non-Government Organizations.

# Post Graduate Diploma in Corporate Social Responsibility

Corporate Social Responsibility is an emerging field in social work practice. Recognizing its relevance, the Post Graduate Diploma in Corporate Social Responsibility was introduced in July 2017. The 4th batch culminated its programme in August 2021. Sixteen students had enrolled for the course, of which eleven students completed the course successfully. Semester II included theory; 180 hours of Fieldwork practicum, and Fieldwork Vivavoce. Some of the placements included Kherwadi Social Welfare Association, Kotak Mahindra Bank Ltd, Hindustan Unilever Ltd, SustaiNumen, Nutan Tiffin Supplier Trust, World Vision Asia Pacific and Sudarshan Chemical Industry Ltd. The 5th batch of eleven students commenced online in August 2021. Students enrolled for the Diploma included professionals serving in various organizations such as Doctor Without Borders India Pvt. Ltd., Elixir Foundation, Rashtriya Chemical & Fertilizers Ltd., Piramal Foundation, Sir Ness WadiaFoundation, and Sir Ratan Tata Trust. Semester I of the Diploma ended in February 2022, and online examinations were held in March 2022 followed by the commencement of Semester II.

The first online Conclave on Corporate Social Responsibility and Sustainable Development was held on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> October 2021. The objective of the Conclave was to provide a platform for corporations, government officials, non-government organizations, academicians and civil society to address the recent developments and emerging social concerns. A total of 160

participants attended the Conclave online. The keynote speaker was Hon. Dr. Prashant Narnaware, IAS, Commissioner, Social Welfare, Pune and the Valeidcitory Speaker was Dr Mahesh Thakur, In charge Director, Karve Institute of Social Service, Pune. The Conclave included a panel discussion of three panelists: Dr Meena Galliaria, Director. Jasani Center For Sustainability Management and Social Entrepreneurship, Narsee Monjee Institute of Management Studies, Mumbai; Mr. Alex Mayes, Responsible Business Manager, Keny Waste Management Ltd, U.K. and Ms. Priya Satish, Social Value Manager, Maximus, UK. Alumni of the P.G. Diploma in CSR programme and the current batch of students were actively involved in the organization of the team alongside the Convenors and Advisory Committee members. Dr Lidwin Dias inaugurated the Conclave and welcomed all the guests and participants. The panel presentation and discussions showcased the phenomenal work of Corporate Social Responsibility and provided interesting insights into the recent global developments in CSR and Sustainable Development.

# Certificate in Social Work For Paraprofessionals

The six-month Certificate in Social Work for Paraprofessionals was started to train grassroots-level workers and individuals interested in social work. The 50<sup>th</sup> batch of the course was completed in March 2021 with a written examination and Fieldwork Vivavoce. Thirty-eight students completed the course. The 51<sup>st</sup> batch commenced in July 2021 with 24 students. Students enrolled for the course were grassroots workers employed in organizations such as Action Against Hunger, Nana Palkar Smruti Samiti, Anudip Foundation, Jeevan Anand Foundation, Jeevan Jyoti Ashram, K.E.M Hospital, Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai, and Bal Anand World Children Welfare Trust India. Outstation students enrolled were from Jeevan Vidya Trust, Nandurbar. Students also included college goers interested in Social Work and homemakers. The varied backgrounds and experiences of the students facilitated the meaningful exchange of knowledge and awareness of social issues during the input session. While the input sessions and workshops on creative arts for intervention were conducted online, Fieldwork of 120 hours was held in a hybrid mode. Theory classes included workshops on creative arts for interventions (use of puppets), community mobilization, leadership, disaster management and first aid. Eleven students completed the course.

The *Sanghmitra Group* is the alumni group of paraprofessionals. Several initiatives of the group have ensured the active involvement of the alumni in the events and programmes of the Extension Center. The Sanghamitra group meets on the third Sunday of every month; organizes input sessions and field visits, and community engagement. The sessions organized in 2021-

2022 were on issues concerning human trafficking by Ms Sharmin Pathan; session on environment awareness by Mr. Jayesh Harsora; child adoption in India by Ms Indira Vilas and Ms. Shital Rebello; waste management composting and home composting by Mr. Ashwini Borude'; screening of documentaries on monsoon-related health and hygiene by Dr Nancy Fernandes and suicide prevention by Dr. Avinash Desouza. An orientation on the Field Action Project Pravas was conducted by Ms Swati Rane, Programme Officer, Pravas and Associate Director, Extension Center Ms Nilima Rodrigues. The orientation session aimed at motivating the members to engage with the project through their community engagement programmes. The core committee members of the Sanghmitra group also organized an orientation for alumni of the paraprofessional course. Students of the 50<sup>th</sup> and 51<sup>st</sup> batch of the Paraprofessional course have taken membership and joined the Sanghmitra Group.

## Certificate Course in Basic Skills in Counselling

The three-month Certificate Course in Basic Skills in Counselling was introduced to develop knowledge, skills and attitudes relevant to counselling. Candidates who had completed any short-term courses offered by the College were eligible to enroll on the course. The 10<sup>th</sup> batch of the Certificate Course in Basic Skills in Counselling was held between March and September 2020. Fourteen students completed the course. The 11<sup>th</sup> batch of the course commenced with a revised syllabus in 2021. Eighteen students had enrolled for the course. Students included working professionals from the Don Bosco Centre For Learning, Project Kalki, Seva Dhan Trust, Nirved Foundation and S.N.E.H.A. The course content included approaches to counselling such as person-centred counselling, micro counselling skills, HIV and Sexuality. HIV Testing, personal growth and Family Case Management. An internship of 160 hours and electives were introduced as part of the course in the revised syllabus.

#### Skill-Based Course in Social Work For Senior Citizens

The three-month Skill-based Course in Social Work for Senior Citizens was launched to promote the scope for lifelong learners to learn and develop their knowledge and skills for social work practice. The 37<sup>th</sup> batch of the course was conducted online between November 2021 and January 2022 with six candidates. The students enrolled for the course included retired professionals from Air India Ltd, H.S.B.C., Rosary School, Times of India, Umrao Hospital and Sir Harkindas Hospital. The units covered in the course included social work methods, social issues, workshops on creative art such as puppet making, healthy practices such as yoga and mindful mediation, positive ageing, social media, laws on property rights, making a will, finance and investment. The Alumni Association of the alumni of the Skill Based Course in Social Work for

Senior Citizens are an active and motivated group. Through regular monthly meetings, the members ensure that they are engaged in meaningful community engagement and skill development. The Ever Young Dance Group of the Association encourages members to engage in dance and movement to promote well-being. The various events organized by the group included a meet and greet session, a music session, yoga, and celebration of international and national days and events such as Independence Day, Ganesh Chaturthi, Dussehra, Diwali, Christmas, New Year, Valentine's Day, Holi and International Women's Day.

# Skill-Based Course in Management of Non-Government Organizations

The six-month Skill-based Course in Management of Non-Government Organizations offers six workshops on governance and legal framework for non-profit organizations and project proposal, monitoring and evaluation, human resource management and communication in non-profit organizations, financial engagement and fundraising. The course is conducted on the second Saturday of the month. Candidates who enrolled for the course had the option to participate in any one of the workshops and receive a participation certificate. In November 2021 four new workshops on Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship, Corporate Social Responsibility, Measuring Impact, Social Return on Investment Framework and Strategic Planning for Sustainability of NGOs were introduced. The workshops were conducted on the second and fourth Saturdays of November and December. The 7<sup>th</sup> batch was launched online in May 2021 with nine candidates enrolling for the course. Students enrolled for the course included working professionals from different organizations such as ASK Investment Managers Ltd, International Justice Mission, Navjeevan Center and Karunya Trust.

#### Value Added Courses

There were four Value Added Courses introduced this academic year: Qualitative Research, Media Skills, Peace Education and Foundation in Social Entrepreneurship Add-on Certificate Course. The RUSA-sponsored Value Added Course on Application of Basic Statistics and Statistical Package for Social Sciences (SPSS) (10<sup>th</sup> January to 7<sup>th</sup> March 2022). The objective of the course was to develop the ability to recognize and utilize simple statistics and SPSS and to conduct simple data analysis relevant to Field Practice. Thirty-six hours of input sessions were organized as part of the course. Twenty-three students across the Bachelor and Master of Social Work enrolled for the course. The course was animated by Mr Ankit Kesri, a PhD scholar from the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai. RUSA sponsored a three-day workshop on Play in Therapy in Social Work Practice Workshop for BSW III was organized in collaboration with Light House. The workshop was designed to provide students with exposure to different components of Play Therapy with a specific emphasis on Clay and Sand Therapy. Students obtained hands-on experience with techniques in play that are enjoyable, inexpensive, and easy to implement in practice The goal of the workshop was to enable students to effectively use Play Therapy as an important intervention in working with children. A child's self-understanding is one of the goals of this approach. Play Therapy can be used either as a primary or adjunct therapy in settings providing child services such as community agencies, psychiatric centres, children's hospitals, schools and shelter homes for women and children. Play Therapists work with children individually, with their families and in group settings. Through the workshop, further insights were given on the concept of play and the different attributive definitions of play.

# STUDENT INDUCTION PROGRAMME/ ORIENTATION PROGRAMME

The academic programme for the Year 2021-2022 commenced with the Induction/Orientation Programme; online/hybrid classes, remedial classes, RUSA-sponsored subject workshops, virtual field visits, webinars and value-added courses.

The purpose of the Student Induction Programme is to help new students adjust and feel comfortable in the new environment, inculcate in them the ethos and culture of the institution, help them build bonds with other students and faculty members, and expose them to a sense of larger purpose and self- exploration. Induction means the whole process whereby the incumbents adjust to or acclimatize to their new roles and environment. It is a planned event to educate the new entrants about the environment in a particular institution and connect them with the people in it. Students are also given information about the professional social work course, the nature, structure, contents, and processes of the course along with academic requirements in terms of attendance, assignments, examination, and the significance of their active participation in all the activities and processes in the College.

#### **FIELDWORK**

The painstaking efforts of the Fieldwork Committee and the Faculty Members/Field Instructors ensured the placement of students in organizations across Mumbai, Raigad and Thane regions for Fieldwork both in online and offline mode for the year 2021-22. Some of the important initiatives of the Fieldwork Committee: Fieldwork Instructors' meeting organized on 14<sup>th</sup> August 2021; Field-based workshops were organized for all the classes on 27<sup>th</sup> September 2021; Coordination of Field Work placements for all the classes, coordination of assessment and feedback of students, coordination of Fieldwork Assessment and organization of Block Placement. Fifty-five students from Master of Social Work, Second Year completed their Block Placement. Of the Fifty-five students, twenty-three students completed their Block Placement outside Maharashtra. One of the major contributions of the Fieldwork Committee was the coordination of the Fieldwork Practicum of Bachelor of Social Work, Semester I due to delayed admissions. The Fieldwork programme was divided into four components: Student Induction Programme; Field-based workshops and inputs; Field based assignments and Field Placement. The assessment of the first three components was handled by the Fieldwork Committee.

# **EXAMINATION**

The Examination Committee geared itself to evolve student-friendly protocols, mode of examinations, and standard operating procedures considering the University Grants Commission, University of Mumbai Government of India, and Government of Maharashtra guidelines about the pandemic. Before the examinations (A.T.K.T and End Semester Examinations), the Committee explored the challenges and lived realities of students, andevolved the procedures for the conduct of examinations accordingly through an online survey using Google Forms. The Continuous Internal Assessment Policy was revised with a caveat. The dates of submissions of marks, preparation of timetables, supervision lists, the conduct of mock online examinations, and orientation to Invigilators, and students on online examinations were some of the tasks the committee contributed to.

# RESEARCH AND TERM PAPER

The Research and Term Paper Committee coordinates the assignment of topics, allotment of guides, student seminars for presentation, and training in skills of research through workshops and the SPSS programme. This year students had both the options of research and term paper projects. One of the important events coordinated by the convenor of the Research Committee annually is the Avishkar Research Convention organized by the Department of Student Development, University of Mumbai. The 15th Inter-Collegiate/Institute/Department Avishkar Research Convention: 2021-22 was organised on a Virtual Platform by the University of Mumbai on June 29, 2021. The Avishkar Research Convention was initiated in the academic year 2007-2008 by His Excellency, the Governor of Maharashtra, and the Chancellor of the Universities, State of Maharashtra, Hon'ble Shri. S.M. Krishna to promote research engagement at every level. The objectives of the Avishkar Research Convention are: to identify the hidden innovative scientific talents and capacities of students; To provide opportunities for inculcating research attitude in the students and teachers; to create academically sound youth by developing knowledge, skill, and attitude of research and to promote aptitude with emphasis on high standards of research and development activities for the benefit of students and teachers. The workshop was conducted by the Avishkar team on 16th June 2021 to give orientation about online presentations during two rounds of the research convention. Dr Ronald Yesudhas and Dr Anita Panot attended this workshop along with the student and teacher participants. For selecting students at the college level for Avishkar 2021, a proposal scrutiny meeting was conducted. Seven students presented their research proposal out of which six were selected to represent for selection round at District and Zonal level. Research proposals were sent by six MSW students and one of the PhD students (faculty) was selected. In the final round organised on a Virtual Platform by the University of Mumbai on June 29, 2021, students whose research proposals were selected were invited for an online presentation in front of the jury panel. The winners of the round included second rank held by Ms Kulkarni Shruti Pravin for the research proposal titled Financial Literacy and Behaviour among Women in Chalisgaon Town (in Jalgaon District of Maharashtra) in Humanities, Languages and Fine Arts category and PG level. Ms Coutinho Nicole Jane participated and presented a research proposal titled Food Habits and Meal Patterns Among Warli Tribes in Sogave, Dahanu in the Humanities, Languages and Fre Arts category and PG level and secured third rank at the Final Round. Dr Ronald Yesudas and Dr Anita Panot received a certificate of Merit for guiding students Ms Shruti Kulkarni and Ms Nicole Coutinho

# STUDENT ENGAGEMENT, SUPPORT, AND PROGRESSION

The student body is the most important stakeholder in the promotion of quality education. The College has always strived to provide necessary assistance to students through several schemes and policies, to acquire meaningful experiences for learning at the campus and to facilitate their holistic development and progression. The College regularly reviews student performance and alumni profiles and the progression of students to higher education and gainful employment. The key aspects of this student engagement, support, and progression include student participation and activities, student progression and student mentoring and support. The several activities have been divided into three categories:

- Student mentoring and support: Student Welfare Committee, counselling services through
  the counselling unit, disability-friendly services and barrier-free environment and
  participation in statutory and non-statutory committees.
- Student Progression: Career Guidance and Job Placement Cell
- Student participation and activities: Student Council, Rotaract Club

# Student Mentoring and Support

The College has facilitated several mechanisms such as a student welfare committee, disability-friendly services, career guidance and job placement cells, grievance redressal cells and welfare measures (counselling services, schemes and remedial classes, value-added courses) to support students.

Students occupy a pivotal position in all activities in the College. The major role of the **Social Welfare Committee** is to support students from the reserved category, minorities and students with disabilities. The Committee aims to address their academic, social, and psychological problems and to facilitate students' participation in academic and co-curricular activities through proper social, sports, and cultural activities. This will enable students to maintain strong relationships; ensure adequate representation of students in intercollegiate events; address students' difficulty in academics by forming student circles and submitting the progress of the group to the Student Welfare Committee; identify students facing financial difficulties, and initiate innovative activities for the students. An orientation on the role of the Student Welfare Committee was organized for MSW I and BSW I classes during the Student Induction/ Orientation Programme by the Faculty Representatives of the Committee. The relevance of the committee, activity calendar, structure, and purpose of the Student Welfare Committee were explained in detail during

the orientation. Students were encouraged to become members of the Committee. The Structure of the Committee: **Chairperson:** Dr Lidwin Dias; **Convenor:** Dr Vaijyanta Anand; **Members:** Dr Anita Machado, Mr Cletus Zuzarte and Mr Sameer Mohite

The first programme organized by the Students Welfare Committee in collaboration with Riya Education was a webinar on "Study Abroad" on 6 October 2021 and 75 students from across the classes participated. The resource persons for the workshop were Ms. Chhaya Kadam and Mr. Vaibhav Dabre from Riya Education. The purpose of this webinar was to guide students of BSW and MSW programs about studying abroad and to inform them about the procedures for studying abroad and their prospects after studying. Resource persons explained the term 'Study Abroad' to the students, which means studying a specialised program/s like a Diploma, Certificate, Bachelor or Master, in a foreign university while living in a foreign country. The session was interactive and students were enthusiastic to know more about overseas studies. Students were encouraged to fulfil their dreams. The second programme organized by the Student Welfare Committee was a Workshop on Exam Preparation and Study Habits for scoring high on 8-9 February 2022. The resource persons for the workshop were Dr. Vaijayanta Anand, Mr. Sameer Mohite and Ms. Shama Sawant. The major emphasis was on what and how to write an exam. Ms Shama started her session by discussing 'Negative Mechanisms' to handle failures in life such as denying the facts, crying out, sleeping and avoiding people i.e. family, and friends. Ms. Shama spoke about 'Positive Mechanisms' to handle failures in life such as accepting how you feel, and not pushing yourself away by distracting yourself or by trying to push the responsibility onto the rest of the world. Mr. Sameer focused on what and how to study. He shared the importance of discipline, managing your study time effectively, note-taking techniques, The SQ3R Method, qualities of a master's student, supportive material from the website, and tips to consider when preparing for and taking exams. Dr. Vaijayanta focused on writing and preparing for exams where she discussed on organization of notes, thoughts, opinions and experiences into answers, reading and understanding questions, organizing answers, length and structure of answers, inclusion of field examples, and review of question bank. Students appreciated the relevance of the session in preparation for the examinations. The third initiative was the Student Study Support Classes. The Study Support Classes were initiated for students in the Bachelor of Social Work (B.S.W.) degree programme to reach out to students representing varied linguistic backgrounds, facing difficulty understanding lectures conducted in English. These Study Support Classes were conducted to help students understand the course content better through the use of Hindi and Marathi which would help them get clarity and prepare better for their upcoming exams.

The College has the following provisions to promote disability-friendly services and a barrier-free environment for people living with disabilities: ramps/lifts for persons with disability for easy access to classrooms and center's; disabled-friendly washrooms available on the third floor of the College; assistive technology and facilities for persons with disability that includes a digital pocket player for reading the e-book, mp3 and radio cum voice recorder – 3 units; special keyboard for visually challenged students – 3 units.

The Vision Centre has JAWS (Job Access with Speech) and NVDA (Nonvisual Desktop Access) which converts the computer into a talking computer. It reads out all the matter that is on the computer's screen through the computer's speakers/ headphones, thus enabling a visually challenged person to use the computer independently and work on all MS Windows applications. The advantages include support for English, Hindi, and Marathi languages; Indian Accent Voice; Precision Optical Character Recognition; Rich Scanning and Reading; Extensive Vision Features; Powerful Document Navigation Tools; Search and Download Books on the Internet; Document Portability; sharing information and enables the visually challenged to fill electronic forms in web pages. Angel Pro is a talking assistive technology device specially designed for the visually challenged. Its features include easy navigation and reading: navigate through ebooks and browse through them page by page; music player plays all music or audio files saved in mp3 radio; gives access to all stations up to broadcasting in FM, medium wave and short wave; direct internal recording from radio; battery level indicator informs battery status; and easy to carry and large storage capacity. The Examination Policy of the College makes provision for human assistance during examinations, fieldwork, scribing, and soft copies of reading materials sometimes even before the class.

Besides integrating mental health literacy through academic and co-curricular programmes, the College has established a **Counselling Unit** to provide promotive, preventive and curative mental health services. Mental health is an integral component of health and well-being and influences

academic, social and economic outcomes across the lifespan. Through its counselling unit the College aimed to create a supportive learning environment for students- one that safeguards mental health, where all learners and education professionals feel included, supported and valued. An effective environment to promote mental health enables improved educational outcomes, increases mental health literacy, promotes learners' social and emotional learning, helps identify at-risk learners provides support, including through referral pathways to mental health services and reduces the likelihood of mental health concerns developing into more severe mental health problems and risk behaviours (UNICEF, 2022). Mental health concerns were further triggered by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Counselling Unit's engagement with students was facilitated by the presentation of its roles and responsibilities during the Student Induction and Orientation programme across all classes. Three workshops were organized by the Counselling Unit for students: A workshop on Group Bonding hybrid mode for 24 Bachelor of Social Work, Semester II students; a half-day workshop on Parenting from the psychosocial perspective with a focus on parenting and communication styles for 25 non-teaching staff members; workshop on Exam Preparation and Study Habits organized by the Student Welfare Committee. Twelve cases were handled by the Counselling Unit over five months. Reasons for approaching the Counsellor ranged from issues concerning interpersonal relationships (love and attraction, marital disputes), intrapersonal concerns (self-esteem), economic concerns, sexuality, substance abuse, time management, stress management and past trauma. Ten of the 12 cases are ongoing.

#### Student Progression

The Career Guidance and Job Placement Cell of the College of Social Work is a student-managed body. The Job Placement Cell helps the students connect with various employment opportunities in varied fields ranging from Non-Governmental Organizations, Private Companies, CSR firms and so on. The Cell has a participatory form of functioning in which students take equal participation in approaching the firms, arranging the interview and so on. Along with this, the cell also coordinates various skill-based training programmes for the students registered within itself so that they can present themselves better during the recruitment process. The Cell is headed by Dr Saman Afroz as the Convenor and Mr Sameer Mohite as the Faculty Advisor, assisted by two student convenors of the Master of Social Work and two student convenors of the Bachelor of Social Work final year. The Cell promotes networking between the students of the College and recruiters from social work organizations across Maharashtra. The Cell undertakes various initiatives to groom and prepare students for suitable employment opportunities such as preparation of the brochure for the academic year, training in interview skills and resume building, pre-placement talks and Interviews.





This is often used to depict the energy of good wishes and prayers that one can send out to the Universe / Almighty / God!), was drawn on card paper and students were invited to write one or two words that express their good wishes and prayers for the people of Russia and Ukraine.



Marking the beginning of Lent, the students were invited to participate in the imposition of ashes for 'Ash Wednesday' during the Eucharist which was celebrated on 2 March 2022. The members of the Management, Staff and Students of the College of Home Science, Staff and Students of CSWNN participated actively. Students across all the classes from BSW I to MSW II took an active part in planning the liturgy and organizing the hymns appropriately. Inviting the students to spend a few moments in quiet reflection as they journey through Lent, the Minority Committee organized a Lenten Talk on "Our Journey

through Lent's shared by Fr. Joshan Rodrigues on the 17 March, from 1.30 pm to 2.30 pm. The moments of adoration before the Blessed Sacrament enabled the students to participate actively in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.



This year's activities were brought to a fitting close with a Thanksgiving Eucharist organized by BSW I & II along with MSW I Students for the outgoing students of BSW II and MSW II. The students prepared a beautiful introduction recounting the various activities and wishing the best to the students. The liturgy was celebrated by Fr. Franklin and Fr. Francisco (Students).

Fr. Franklin sharing his faith experience invited the students to share on their faith journey especially the presence of God during the COVID times. Ms. Shanti – an MSW II student shared her faith journey thanking the College for the various activities that built them during their short academic life post-Covid. Mr. Cletus Zuzarte also shared about the presence of God during COVID-19 and God's protective presence in his life.

# MEASURES INITIATED FOR THE PROMOTION OF GENDER EQUITY

The College of Social Work was founded in 1955 by a band of valiant women known as the daughters of the Heart of Mary, whose mission was to readily respond to the felt needs of the people according to the signs of the time. The vision and mission of the College are to contribute to building a new social order based on human dignity and social justice, work with a preferential option for the vulnerable and exploited, both locally and globally, and build a cadre of young, competent professionals having a global perspective and a strong value base of compassion, personal integrity, moderation, tolerance, and self-respect. Promoting a gender-just society through our academic and field-based programmes has been a major thrust of the College. Some important initiatives undertaken by the College are enumerated below based on the international, national, and church-based policies: The Convention of Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination against Women, the Indian Constitution, the Sexual Harassment at Workplace Act (Prevention, Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 2013, and the Gender Policy of the Catholic Church, 2009.

#### WOMEN DEVELOPMENT CELL

The Women's Development Cell (WDC actively promotes gender awareness and equality. The Cell is committed to sensitizing students on issues related to gender equity. Every year, the cell consciously works with the students to build gender awareness and equality on the College campus through mindfully planned activities and observances of important days, and the program budget is approved by the principal. The Cell includes representatives from various stakeholders: Faculty Representatives; Representatives from Non-Teaching Staff and students. Some important initiatives based on the international, and national policies, undertaken by the College under the WDC have been enumerated below:

#### Gender Discrimination in Sports, 11 October 2021

A session on *Gender Discrimination in Sports* was organized by the WDC. The resource person for the session was Ms. Meha Bhardwaj. The session highlighted the challenges and discrimination faced by Women sportspersons; she was able to highlight these challenges better as being a sports presenter she was in proximity to Women Sportspersons. Ms. Bhardwaj shared about her journey as a sports presenter in a male-dominated profession, even if a woman is a presenter for sports, she is stereotyped to have certain feminine qualities and behave in a particular manner and is not supposed to be bold and talk sense.

# 11th Kranti Jyoti Savitribai Phule Lecture Series, 5 January 2022

At this event, a pre-recorded experimental play was shown by MAVA on *Mard ko Dard Hota Hai*, mainly to raise awareness about issues of gender inequality and to use theatre as an impactful medium to reach out and challenge notions related to patriarchy and masculinity. There was a lecture by Ms. Rashika Agashe on the Gender Representation of Women in Indian Films/TV. She reiterated that the media and entertainment industry influence the members of society greatly, and hence the entire media and entertainment industry has a responsibility to reflect on what they are making and showcasing in the movies, advertisements, television, news, and so on.

## International Women's Day 8-9 March 2022

A range of events was organized which included breaking the bias stamping on the hands of students, pledge-taking across the classes, and talks by eminent Resource persons. Dr. Vibhuti Patel, a Professor, at Tata Institute of Social Sciences, gave a talk on Her-story of Feminism in India. She reiterated the fact that our history has always been a HIS-STORY, it is essential that HER-STORY of history is presented to our young generation and the contribution of various

female unsung heroes is brought to the forefront. Ms. Meena Kotwal, a former BBC journalist also delivered a lecture on the Intersectionality of Caste and Gender. She presented a very experiential session based on her experiences of gender discrimination being a Dalit female journalist at BBC.

#### INTERNAL COMPLAINTS COMMITTEE (ICC)

Orientation to students organized across classes (regular courses) on the prevention of Sexual Harassment at the workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Regulation Act 2013), was conducted during the Student Induction and Orientation Programme. Students were given information on the redressal mechanisms for dealing with Sexual Harassment at the Workplace, Prevention of Sexual Harassment, and the safety policy of the College. All Fieldwork Organizations are given a copy of the Safety Policy and given an orientation on the need for creating safe spaces for students during Fieldwork Practicum.

#### GENDER ISSUES INTEGRATED WITH CURRICULUM

Besides being offered as a Core subject in Bachelor of Social Work, Semester III, and Master of Social Work, Semester IV Gender as a theme cuts across various subjects that are offered by the College including Human Rights, Ageing, and Work with Disability. Health and Mental Health, Therapeutic Skills.

#### FEMINIST SOCIAL WORK PRACTICE THROUGH FIELDWORK PRACTICUM

Students are placed in a range of fieldwork settings working on Gender-based Violence, Gender Justice, Women's health, and related themes. Some of the organizations include MAVA, Sakhya, SNEHA, MAVIM, Prerana, and Spandan (field action project of the College of Social Work). Placements in organizations provide students an opportunity to critically reflect upon, internalize, and integrate Feminist Social Work Practice principles in the field.

#### **RUSA BASED WORKSHOPS**

Various workshops were organized for students on themes concerning gender. Though the workshops were hosted by the Women Studies course it was open for all students and faculty to attend.

#### LIVELIHOOD INITIATIVES

Besides, the field action projects of the College are also working for the cause of Gender equity. The Field Action Project Anubhav Youth Development Centre conducted a session on Gender justice and healthy and safe interpersonal relationships among 14 Colleges in Mumbai. Spandan is a Field Action Project started in 2017 to promote sustainable development for better livelihoods of the tribes. The project focuses on malnutrition in the Savroli and Anwir villages of the Talsari block of Palghar district, Maharashtra. Through its various projects, Spandhan promotes livelihood, antenatal care/ reproductive health, nutrition, and gender-based discrimination in collaboration with the local self-government bodies.

#### GENDER-SENSITIVE PROVISIONS FOR FEMALE STAFF AND STUDENTS

Female Staff Members with minor children are provided concessions and childcare leave as and when needed. The College has special provisions for the female staff and female students: A sanitary napkin dispensing machine has been fitted in the washroom. A girls' common room is available on the second floor. Rest room for students who identify as transgenderism is available on the third floor. Special sanctions are provided for pregnant and lactating mothers and staff engaged in caregiving roles.

# JOB PLACEMENT COMMITTEE

Organization of meetings

A meeting was held with JPC Faculty convenors i.e., Dr. Saman Afroz and Mr. Sameer Mohite on 6<sup>th</sup> December 2021 to conduct an orientation of campus recruitment with students of MSW second year and BSW third year students. The JPC committee was also formed in the same meeting. A meeting was held on 9<sup>th</sup> December 2021 with JPC committee members from MSW-II and BSW-III to discuss the timeline and process of campus recruitment for the year 2021-22. The roles and duties of all sub-committees were revised. The timeline for preparing the brochure and creating organisation data was also discussed. A meeting with Job placement cell committee members from MSW-II and BSW-III was conducted on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 2021 to discuss progress regarding the brochure and timeline for campus recruitment. Special attention was to be given to preparing the organisation's data so that they could be contacted for campus recruitment as soon as possible. Deadlines were set for submission of the placement brochure and organisation database. A meeting was arranged with the placement cell committee members on 6<sup>th</sup> January 2022 to discuss

the placement process and arrange workshops to enhance employability skills. A meeting was arranged on 12<sup>th</sup> January 2022 to discuss the pre-placement talks in the pipeline and the tasks distributed among the committee members.

#### Administrative and Documentation Tasks

A database of all the students sitting for campus placement along with their academic details was made. The Placement Policy and Registration Forms for the organisation were prepared and submitted by the convenors on 15<sup>th</sup> December 2021. The final Placement Brochure for the year 2021-2022 was submitted by the brochure committee on 9<sup>th</sup> January 2022. The organisation database was completed and submitted to the JPC convenors to send across the organisation's placement brochure and invite them for campus placement.

## Organization of Workshops

The first workshop on CV writing, interviews and group discussion was taken by Mr. Adrian Rosario on 10<sup>th</sup> January 2022. Varun Beverages PepsiCo reached out with some HR roles to the Job Placement Cell and names of interested students were send across to them. Azim Premji University held a session with the final year students of BSW and MSW on 17<sup>th</sup> January 2022 to share about the post-graduation courses they were offering. The preplacement talks of U & I, Swades Foundation, Anudip, Apnishala, Apne Aap Women's Collective, Radhe, Arpan, YouCanFreeUs India, Garbage free India, Mentor Together and RPG Foundation. The attendance in these preplacement talks were getting reduced so the committee decided to implement the rule that only those who attend the preplacement talks will be allowed to apply and sit for the interviews of the specific organisation.

# Placement organizations

Vedanta reached out to the JPC to recruit MSW-II students for Corporate Social Responsibility. The first pre-placement talk by U & I was held on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 2021. On 19<sup>th</sup> January 2022, Mrs. Trinjhana Khattar was invited to take a workshop on CV writing, preparing for interviews, group discussions and how to seek jobs. On 14<sup>th</sup> March 2022, Mr. Ajay Damodar took up a workshop on how to look for jobs, how to apply and how to prepare for job interviews.

A total of 11 recruiting organizations conducted pre-placement talks till first week of May 2022. The ROs offered more than 30 job positions for BSW and MSW students. Until 18<sup>th</sup> May 2022, a total of 12 students have been selected by four organizations as given below-

## **ECO FRIENDY INITITATIVES**

Waste segregation initiatives: Provision of separate bins for wet and dry waste as per the Brihanmumbai Corporation Guidelines; Orientation to all the classes to create consciousness towards keeping the environment clean through regular announcements; Students are encouraged to keep their classrooms clean by taking responsibility for ensuring cleanliness and cleaning it on their own (*Shramdaan*) when required housekeeping staff and gardeners help in the segregation of waste. It is segregated at the source and collected by *Safai Karmachari* to dispose of properly in the dumping yards of the Municipal Corporation.

**Solid Waste Management initiatives:** Waste is systematically collected, segregated, and sold to authorized vendors for recycling. The College adopts an almost paperless concept through the digitization of office procedures through electronic means via *WhatsApp*, email, and Google Classroom. The use of paper printed on one side is encouraged in sending faxes, printing drafts before the final document, meeting minutes, memos, and notes in the office. Students are encouraged to use wastepaper and newspapers in creative practices during various subject-based workshops and extracurricular activities.

**Bio-Medical waste management:** Arrangements for the disposal of Sanitary napkins are made in all the washrooms of the College.

**E-waste management initiatives:** Electronic gadgets are repaired for minor defects to ensure their optimum utilization. Electronic waste components such as computer system components, CPUs, and ICs are used in a practical demonstration for our students.

Waste Recycle System: The College encourages paperless work. Paper waste is sold out for recycling in the paper industry. An Eco bricks collection challenge was organized across 5 classes to instill responsibility to act toward climate change and waste segregation. The initiative saw the participation of all classes and the club was able to collect 55 such eco-bricks. As the time coincided with Christmas, the students arranged these bottles in the form of a Christmas tree to add to the college décor. A decision was taken in the Faculty Meeting to ban the use of plastic for any event. Paper-made products and cloth bags are to be utilized for kits. Construction of Bore Well and tank with a line of connections marked in red to distinguish them from the municipal connections are constructed for multipurpose use (other than drinking) use in washrooms, gardening and so on.

Environmental Justice sessions conducted across colleges by Anubhav Youth Development Center, Field Action Project of the College. Anubhav Youth Development Centre has conducted 14 sessions, 9 offline and 5 online. AYDC started the sessions in September 2021 based on the six core values that include Democracy and Secularism, Gender Justice, Social Justice, Scientific Temper, Dignity of Labour and Environmental Justice based on its module *Laher*. The sessions were conducted in Shailendra Degree College, Shailendra Jr. College, KES College, J. M. Patel College and Santosh Nagar Community. A total of 242 youths benefited at the Mitra Level.

Green Campus Initiatives: The institution is constructed in the middle of central Mumbai and is easily accessible by public transport bus and train from all three railway lines: western, central, and Harbour lines. The easy accessibility of the institution encourages staff and students to use public transport. For the benefit of all stakeholders, there are pedestrian-friendly pathways and restricted parking facilities that ensure walking safely throughout the campus. Security staff is assigned to the main entrance to ensure the monitoring of the rules related to parking. The institution also has beautiful landscaping with a variety of trees and plants some of which have

medicinal value. Sapplings from the garden are gifted to guests and visitors to the college. Plastic is strictly banned in college. Materials made from paper and indigenous cultures are intentionally utilized for all college programmes and events.

# FIELD ACTION PROJECTS

Through its Field Action Project, **DEVELOPMENT CENTER**at the Extension Center has grounded on international empowerment of youth through community engagement, and

(AYDC), the College of Social Work initiated various interventions strategic principles for the networking and mobilization, advocacy. The AYDC foregrounds

its various initiatives on the principles of the Global Framework for Youth Mental Health: awareness; early intervention; youth partnership; and prevention. Youth engagement is the bedrock of all interventions of AYDC. The outcome of AYDC interventions is to create a cadre of youth who are competent, aware, and critical thinkers and capable of grassroots leadership. Youth trained under the AYDC will be expected to initiate grassroots interventions in both areas as first-level engagement. Some of the interventions of AYDC included:

**Need Assessment** for the perspective plan through dialogue and reflection with various stakeholders of AYDC (7 August 2021, 21<sup>st</sup> November 2021);

Skill Development Initiative with 'Shwas Youth Career Guidance Institute, LLP', registration with Nehru Yuva Mandal. In Collaboration with Shwas Youth Career Guidance Institute, LLP, AYDC shared the course of Account Executive with the youth offered by The American Indian Foundation. Thirty-two students enrolled for the course. In collaboration with Nehru Yuva Kendra, Mumbai, AYDC provided an opportunity for the youth to contact 50 youth manuals and non-government organizations to register with the Nehru Yuva Kendra.

**Information dissemination** on fellowships, scholarships, (State Bank of India fellowship, Nirman Youth Leadership Programme, Facebook Fellowship supporting PhD students, UDAAN fellowship for youth leaders and policymakers, UNESCO, Kotak Kanya Scholarship initiated by Kotak Education Foundation, for the first-year undergraduate girl student)

✓ Youth Awards (Yashwantrao Chavhan State Level Youth Award 2021-22. Sports and Social Youth Award)

**Fourteen capacity-building sessions**, (9 offline and 5 online) in four colleges and one community reaching out to 242 youth on topics related to democracy and secularism; gender justice and social justice;

**Webinar** in collaboration with Kripa Foundation on Prevention of Substance Use participants (14<sup>th</sup> May 2021).

**Workshops on Personality Development** (Interpersonal Skills on 5<sup>th</sup> December 2021 with 47 youth and communication skills on 5<sup>th</sup> December 2021 with 37 youth of the Santosh Nagar community)

**Sports Day**: On 7<sup>th</sup> January 2022, a half-day sports competition was organised by AYDC in collaboration with Nehru Youth Kendra. There were a total of 48 participants from different colleges and communities. Events organized during the Sports Day included Chess competitions, 100 metres, 200 metres, and 400 meters. The Chief Guest for the events was Mr. Yashwant Mankhedkar, Dy. Director, Nehru Youth Kendra Mumbai.

Career counselling and guidance for youth at Talsari block of Palghar district, Maharashtra; rural camp and the Mumbai Suburban Youth Festival were also important events organized in the academic year.

**SPANDAN** was started in 2017 to promote sustainable development for the tribal communities of Talsari block of Palghar district, Maharashtra through its various livelihood initiatives, nutrition programmes, kitchen gardens, and reproductive and mental health. The operational office is at Gyanjyoti Community College Karajgaon. Gyanajyoti Community College located at Karajgaon was envisaged to provide Skill-based education that is accessible to many marginalized communities with a specific emphasis on the indigenous groups. The focus is to provide a flexible and open education system that caters to community-based lifelong learning needs. Initiated through school interventions and group sessions with adolescents the project is reaching out to several tribal hamlets.

## The project activities included:

- ✓ Sakhi: Spandan intervenes with women through Anganwadi centres and existing Self Help Groups and organizes various sessions for women on issues related to reproductive health, ill effects of early motherhood, the importance of self-help groups, and the role of women in village development and the importance of diverse diet;
- ✓ *Kishordhara* focuses on issues with an emphasis on mental health, in addition, emphasis is also provided onskill development, personality development, and career guidance;
- ✓ *Unnati* initiated to provide alternate livelihood options for the community youth and families by providing training in different skills;
- ✓ Satwaahar focuses on ensuring continued learning and practice of setting up eco-friendly projects with an emphasis on setting up kitchen gardens to improve families' food and dietary conditions.
- ✓ Some of the initiatives of Spandan were health promotion through door-to-door awareness, small group meetings and educational sessions, capacity building of animators in various villages; medical aid; a celebration of national and international events, and the use of street theatre for awareness.



**PRAVAS** the Field Action Project of the College of Social Work was inaugurated in 2019 to identify, mobilize and engage the elderly in vulnerable spaces across dwellings in Bhagat Singh Nagar, Goregaon East. The perspective of the 'elderly as a resource' is a major paradigm shift in Gerontology, promoting a strength-based approach. The strengths-based

approach operates on the assumption that people have strengths and resources for their empowerment (Ponnuswami, Francis, Udhayakumar, 2019). Over the years Pravas not only obtained first-hand information through door-to-door campaigns, small group meetings with various stakeholders, and campaigns in Bahgat Singh Nagar but also formed support groups in the communities of the elderly across various faith and cultural practices. The four groups Yash, Ekta, and Namrata formed zone-wise have facilitated a safe space for the elderly to collectivize, dialogue, conscientize and engage. The work with individuals and families, and social group work with the elderly enabled the Prayas team to provide information about the array of services available to the elderly, coordinate care across various health systems, facilitate family support, provide direct counselling services, and provide skills for active engagement of the elderly. The strength-based initiatives included the transfer of knowledge and skills useful in self-care to elderly communities; providing training and motivation for clients to critically analyzetheir life situation and take part in consciousness-raising experiences; enabling clients to develop or maintain personal support networks; and inclusion of clients in the evaluation process of the programmes. Bridging the generation gap through sensitization and dialogue has also been another initiative of Pravas. Some of the initiatives of PRAVAS have been group work through meetings, sessions (educational, creative art); medical camps; need assessment on theimpact of Covid 19; cultural celebrations; knowledge and awareness sessions on government schemes and provisions for the elderly; and obtaining senior citizen health cards for the elderly. The activities undertaken by Pravas include:

- A **short documentary** on 'Overall Journey of Pravas' by Student Social Workers with the elderly of Bhagat Singh Nagar on 8<sup>th</sup> May 2021.
- Survey on the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic' by the Student Social Workers on the lives of elderly people living in urban marginalised communities of Goregaon West. The findings of the survey revealed that most of the respondents were retired or jobless due to the pandemic. Some of them were undergoing health issues making it difficult to take up jobs. Few women between the age group of 60-69 had problems like arthritis and other joint pain Most of the respondents were working in the informal sector as industrial

workers or domestic helpers. More than half of the respondents shared that they had received support from Pravas in the form of kind: food grains, masks, and sanitisers. The elderly face chronic health issues such as diabetes, high blood pressure, arthritis and asthma causing them to spend money on medicines. None of the respondents have their Senior Citizens' Cards. None of the respondents had taken the COVID-19 vaccine.

- Provision of Senior Citizens' Cards: On 17<sup>th</sup> October 2021, the District Collector's Officer issued senior citizen cards to 11 elderly.
- Initiating the Skill Development (Income Generation Activity) in collaboration with C. B. Kora Institute. Pravas mobilized the elderly in the Bhagat Singh Nagar community through several meetings and provided them with orientation on the various courses available at Kora Kendra. The basic training programme has also been scheduled. Microsessions, workshops and health camps

- Diwali celebration through vairous activities included action songs and diya painting. The painted diyas were given back to the senior citizens to be lit in their homes on the day of Diwali (1st November 2021)
- •Christmas celebration. The main highlight of the event was the skit on Girl Child (23rd December 2021) (40 participants).

## **SAKSHAM**

The National AIDS Control Organisation and National TB Elimination Program (Primary Recipients) have received funds from the Global Fund for strengthening the national level efforts in addressing HIV/ AIDS and TB. The primary recipients have roped in Tata Institute of Social Sciences (Sub Recipient) and through TISS have partnered with five Regional Institutes for Capacity Building and Evaluation (Sub-Sub Recipients). The five institutions are divided into five zones- East, North, South, West and Central. The College of Social Work (Autonomous) is responsible for the West Zone which includes the State of Goa, Karnataka, Maharashtra and the District of Mumbai. The two projects under Saksham are (a) Saksham Pramaan- Evaluation of HIV/ AIDS Targeted Intervention (TI) and Link Workers' Scheme (LWS); and (b) Saksham Pravaah- Capacity Building of the National TB Elimination Programme (NTEP) staff on psycho-social aspects of TB and counselling. The College of Social Work (Autonomous) is closely working with the State AIDS Control Societies (SACSs) to conduct the seamless evaluation in Western Zone and complete the task as per the NACO timeline. The main objective of the project is 'to support the National AIDS Control Program (NACP) through building capacities of evaluators and to coordinate evaluations of TI and LWS along with SACSs. The TIs reach out to the key High-Risk groups (HRGs) such as Female Sex Workers (FSW), Males having sexwith Males (MSM), Transgender (TG), Injecting Drug Users (IDUs) and Bridge Populations such as Migrants and Long-Distance Truckers. Link Worker Scheme (LWS) reaches out to HRGs, Bridge Population and Vulnerable Population residing in rural areas.

Three days of National Level training for all Saksham Pramaan staff, including the Faculty in-Charge and Finance Officer, was organized by Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai and conducted by National AIDS Control Organization (NACO), in November 2021, in Delhi. After the training, the major tasks undertaken by the College included the identification and empanelment of an Evaluator based on the ToR, by connecting with various Schools of Social Work, Departments of Psychology, the State Institute of Health & Family Welfare (SIHFW), State Health System Resources Centre (SHSRC), Representative from People Living with HIV (PLHIV), and community network; conducting capacity building workshops for the evaluators, preparing a calendar of evaluation in consultation with sacs and facilitating and monitoring the evaluators in coordination with SACS.

Saksham Pravaah provides training and capacity building to counsellors working with People Living with Drug-Resistant TB. The tasks to be taken under Saksham Pravaah include the development of a pool of Master Trainers (MT); the Establishment of a strong co-ordination mechanism with the State TB Officer (STO), and State Training Demonstration Centre (STDC) in the region; Conducting Training of Trainers (ToTs) for the Master Trainers in co-ordination with TISS Saksham; Identification of Trainer in the region; Undertaking Training of Trainers and NTEP Staff in coordination with the STDC Staff.

# NIRMITI CENTRE FOR SOCIAL INNOVATION AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP

With the Autonomous status, the college inaugurated the Nirmiti Centre for Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship on 9<sup>th</sup> July 2019. The centre aims to support social entrepreneurship and offer academic programs where the students get guidance, mentoring, physical space and network for value-based collaboration. The Centre is located on the third floorof the College. Pre-Incubation Meeting Room is available on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of the college. In the year 2021, hecollege was *ranked as Performer* in the Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievements (ARIIA) of the Ministry of Education (MoE). The components of Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievements(ARIIA) are as follows:

#### Elective Course

For the BSW program, (5th-semester students) a two-credit (30 hours) elective on Social Entrepreneurship is offered from September to November 2021, 49 students were enrolled for the same and duly completed the course. # Infrastructure & Facilities to Promote I & E Activities: Student Clubs, Innovation, Pre-Incubation and Incubation Facilities, Services and Supports

#### E-Cell (Students Club)

E-Cell (Students Club), established in 2019 is an *Idea Club* initiative of the Nirmiti Centre forSocial Innovation and Entrepreneurship that aims to foster the spirit of entrepreneurship amongst the students at the College of Social Work. Fifty-five students are enrolled thisyear in E-Cell and Mr. Cletus continues to be the Faculty In-Charge of the E-Cell. Ms. Shruti Kulkarni (MSW I) was the Student Representative for the Start-Up/Internship. Ms. Nicole Colaco (MSW I) was the Student Representative for IPR. Ms. Bella Bhosale (BSW III) was the Student Representative for

Innovation / SocialMedia. Some of the activities are listed below:

Students Day Out (Students spend time with an Entrepreneur/ Enterprise- for a day): Interacting with Social Entrepreneurs during the Add Course in the Session on Understanding the Journey of a Social Entrepreneur held on the 30<sup>th</sup> January 2022 and later during the Exposure Visit of 16 Add On Course Students to RiiDL – Somaiya College Incubator held on the 29<sup>th</sup> March 2022; visit of the NCSIE team and two Partners along with Six Rural Entrepreneurs to three RuralEntrepreneurs Initiatives at Mangaon, Raigad Dt. on the 27<sup>th</sup> February 2022; Boot camps – Icebreaking Workshop held on the 17<sup>th</sup> of July, 2021 and Pitch – Business Plan Presentations held on the 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022 as part of the Add on Course were also some of the major events organized.

#### Pre-Incubation

The pre-incubation stage starts with ideation. During this period, the potential entrepreneur develops the idea into a 'proof of concept' and prepares to understand the technical feasibility of the idea proposed. Once a marketable service/product idea has evolved, prototyping and testing are done and the suitable students will be then referred for the Incubation Stage. As of now on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022 8 teams are in this stage.

#### Incubation

The incubation programme shall be fully functional from October 2021. The incubation stage will be a 5-month process of helping start-up companies/ non-profits graft products/services and prepare themselves for marketing. The centre offers a wide array of value-added services to speed up the incubation cycle. As of now, three persons/teams are being prepared to undertake this stage of Incubation.

# Intellectual Property

The College has worked on creating modules for Entrepreneurship Development Programmes which consists of an Entrepreneurship Development Toolkit and a Manual for Training of Trainers in Entrepreneurship. This has been made available online through a Creative Commons License. Currently, the team is working on the Publication of the same in hard copies which can be disseminated for use among NCSIE Partners.

#### Initiating the Skills Hub Initiative for the job role of Office Assistant

On 4th January 2022, the College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan received an email from the UGC Education Officer stating that the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Skills Development and Entrepreneurship have envisioned skill training hubs across the country. These skill hubs would offer competency-based vocational training for school drop-out and out-ofschool young populations. This initiative is implemented through National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) under the Central Component of Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana 3.0 (PMKVY 3.0). All the institutes identified as skills hubs shall offer short-term skill-based programmes/courses in one of two job roles. As per the UGC guidelines, the Skill Hub Initiative officially commenced on 1st January 2022. However, the College launched the course on 30th March 2022 After receiving this notification, a team was formed immediately by the college to study the guidelines and short-list the type of job roles the college could host training on. The criteria for selecting the course were availability of infrastructure facility, technical know-how by the faculty (who were to be the trainer for the programme) and ensured job placement on the successful completion of the programme. About 80 per cent of the candidate must be placed into industry after the successful completion of the course. After a series of meetings, the job role finalized for the implementation of the Skill Hub Initiative was 'Office Assistant". The Office Assistant course would be launched under the Management and Entrepreneurship and Professional Skill Council. Since the focus of the skill-based vocational training was on school drop-out and out-of-school youth, the team realized how vulnerable they are to being absorbed into the informal sector. The team rationalized that training in an office assistant would give them a chance to the youth to enter into the formal sector and learn skills that would help them climb up the ladder as well and the job may allow them to return to the education system and enhance their qualification further.



# Conclave on Corporate Social Responsibility and Sustainable Development

The Extension Centre organised the first online Conclave on Corporate Social Responsibility and Sustainable Development on 9<sup>th</sup> October 2021 to provide a common platform to corporates, government officials, NGOs, Academicians and Civil Society to address the social challenges faced by the State. A total of 160 people attended the online conclave. The Key Note Speaker was Hon. Dr Prashant Narnaware, IAS, Commissioner, Social Welfare, Pune and the Valedictory Speaker was Dr Mahesh Thakur Charge Director, of Karve Institute of Social Service, Pune.

# Certificate Course in Bio Ethics 2021-2022 by F.I.A.M.C Bio-Medical Ethics Center

The launch of the Certificate Course Bio-Medical Ethics 2020 - 2021 in collaboration with the College provided an enriching platform for thought-provoking deliberations on philosophical, social, and legal issues arising in medicine and the life sciences concerned with human life and well-being. Designed on the lines of the Master of Global Ethics-Online Program (UNESCO Chair on Bioethics and Human Rights) the course dealt with the respect for the sanctity of life, the integrity of the human being, and the protection of health from conception to natural death, considering the person in his [or her] singularity, always as an end and never



simply as a means. The nine modules, with four topics in each module, provided insightful knowledge dissemination and provoked dialogue and reflection. The nine modules focused on Bio-Medical Ethics- the what, the why, and the when (Module I), Ethical Concerns at the Beginning of Life Issues (Module 2), Concerns regarding Current Sexual Behaviours (Module 3), Ethical Issues in Human Organ Donation & Transplantation (Module 4), Issues in Mental Health Diagnosis and Treatment (Module 5), Ethical Issues in Acutely ill and Intensive Care Settings (Module 6), Ethical Issues Arising in Surgical and Cancer Care (Module 7), Ethical Issues in Handling Deviant Behaviours (Module 8) and End of Life Issues (Module 9). The course brought together knowledge, life experiences, and perspectives of lifelong learners, professionals, laity, social workers, psychologists, counsellors, other healthcare providers, and caregivers across the

globe and empowered each one to develop a critical perspective grounded in human rights, social work values principles and a pro-life framework upholding the value of life and the inherent dignity of the human person in every capacity. Seventeen participants enrolled for the course.

#### The Global Campus Online Peace Education Programme.

The global campus online Peace education program contributes to the realization of societies based on the principles of sustainable peace, human dignity and equality through university partnerships. The course on peace and conflict studies elaborates on conflict processes, their dynamics and possible interventions to resolve conflicts peacefully. The course equips students with the skills and competence to analyse and apply peace and conflict theories in the context of international diversity. This course is conducted in collaboration with the Global Campus Programme of Tokyo University of Foreign Studies, Japan and partnership with four other universities in South Asia- the Gadjah Mada University (Universitas Gadjah Mada), Indonesia, the Pannasastra University of Cambodia, the Peradeniya University, Sri Lanka, Quaid- Azam University, Islamabad, and the Islamic University of Science and Technology, Srinagar, India. The course is coordinated by Dr Anita Panot at the Mumbai level for the students of the College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan. The course consisted of five sessions with 22 participants from India and 18 received certificates for participation. Dr Ram Puniyani was invited as a guest lecturer for 4th Session on 6th July 2021.

#### RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT CELL

The Research Unit, College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan, Mumbai was established on September 8, 1993, to promote scientific research in Social Work education and practice and develop a scientific rigour in understanding social issues that impact human lives. To achieve this the Research Unit has been successfully undertaking independent research studies, commissioned research, consultancy, capacity building in research methods and documentation for various groups including students, data collectors, social work professionals and students pursuing their research degrees. The findings of the research studies undertaken by the Research Unit build the knowledge base of the profession. Every year Research Unit also undertakes capacity-building workshops for NGOs, Government employees and corporate staff based on qualitative and quantitative research techniques. Training on research methodology is also imparted to faculty and social work students by the staff of the research unit. The Director of the Research Unit is also invited as a guest speaker in various institutions, educational and otherwise for conducting workshops/sessions on topics related to Research, and Statistics.

#### Certificate Course in Advanced Social Research Methodology

The Research Unit coordinates the Certificate Course in Advanced Social Research Methodology. There were 21 registrations received altogether and the sessions/ lectures are being taken by well-known professionals from the field of Social Research. The lectures are conducted in the evenings Monday to Thursday from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm.

# Qualitative Research Methodology Add on Course

The Qualitative Research Methodology add-on course was conducted for the MSW-I students. It was held every Wednesday and Thursday from 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm starting from 19<sup>th</sup> January to 10<sup>th</sup> March 2022 for a period of two and half months. The course was divided into four units which covered an introduction to qualitative research paradigm; qualitative perspectives and qualitative research designs; conceptualization and sampling in qualitative research methods; tools of data collection in qualitative research; qualitative data analysis; and report writing. As part of the course assignment students were asked to prepare and present a proposal of a research study in qualitative research on 10<sup>th</sup> March 2022.

# **IQAC INITIATIVES**

The IQAC has been at the forefront in ensuring that academic vigour and community engagement continue through dialogue with stakeholders and peers and grassroots interventions. The IQAC spearheaded various discussions with stakeholders on responding to the challengesto education caused by the Pandemic. Development of a plan of action for curriculum and Fieldwork based on need assessment; guiding and providing feedback to committees for implementation of annual plans; review of value-added courses; coordinating feedback; review and finalization of the syllabus, prospectus; documentation and report writing were important initiatives taken by the IQAC. The IQAC also organized webinars and staff development programmes during the academic year and finalized the academic calendar was the first major and challenging task of the IQAC.

## **RUSA Sponsored Conferences**

State Level Online Conference on Child Protection: Concerns and Responses during COVID-19 Pandemic was organised on 4th-5th October 2021. The conference was aimed at identifying child protection concerns in the pandemic context, learning about the response of both government and civil society towards addressing those concerns and also undertaking concerted efforts in the field of child protection at the Maharashtra level. It was a successful endeavour and the best part was that we had an overwhelming response from organizations working within the domain of child protection not just in terms of participation but also in terms of paper presentation. Organizations such as Prayas, Family Service Center, ILS Law College Pune, CSRD, Amcha Ghar, YWCA, MESCO, Responsible Netism, Rangoonwala Foundation, Save the Children, DWCD Palghar etc were part of the conference. As a follow-up to the conference, a Child Protection Coordination Committee is set up having members from the College (Dr Renu Shah, Ms Meghna and Ms. Pallavi) and representatives from the above-mentioned organizations. It is intended to initiate and/or coordinate concerted efforts in the field of child protection within the state of Maharashtra through this committee. As an outcome of the conference, a three-series workshop was organized for functionaries engaged in child protection in Mumbai and Maharashtra. The themes were Child Protection and Child Rights in Crisis Situations including the COVID-19 pandemic: An Overview of Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act 2016 and JJ Rules and Role of Child Welfare Officers in CCIs and Significance of Individual Care Plan (ICP).

## Dr. Dorothy Baker Chair Lecture Series on Peace and Development 18th December 2021

Dr Rajesh Tandon was invited as the Keynote speaker who delivered a talk on 'Civil society and participatory democracy - a way to peace and development'. On the same occasion, Dr Hazel D'lima released a book titled Networking and Women in Local Governance, edited by Mr Rajesh Kuruvilla and published by the Resource and Support Centre for Development (RSCD). Mr. Bhim Raskar from RSCD anchored the book release.

# National level Online Conference on Migrant labor and Covid-19 pandemic, 28th February, 1st March 2022


The online National Conference on Migrant Labour and the 19 Pandemic provided a platform for esteemed speakers to express their deep-rooted concerns for the plight of migrants in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic and the need for immediate interventions. Dr Vaijavanta Anand gave a contextual background to the Conference, triggered by the exodus of the migrants precipitating a severe 'crisis of mobility', with migrant labourers in many major cities seeking to return to their hometowns. The migrants had no provision of a social safety net, without livelihood options, and decided to make their way home. With a lack of access to transport, many had to face great ordeal to reach their home town. Bishop. Allwyn Dsilva began his presentation by describing the profile of the migrant. He explained the informal sector in which they work, the lack of access to their right, and the abuses they experience in various forms. He shared about why people migrate and where they work. He presented the challenges of migrants during the lockdown. Panel I presentations included presentations on Migrant Labor, Livelihood crises during a pandemic, response of the government and Media. Panel II included presentations on the Causal factors for the livelihood crisis of migrant labour in pandemic lockdowns and the Response of civil societies, Faith-based organizations, and Social work Colleges. Day two included Panel III and Panel IV. Presentations were on the Livelihood crisis of the migrant labour returning to rural areas in multiple lockdowns' and working with Government and civil society alliances in Panel III and on Redefining livelihood options in pandemic post lockdowns and critical review of labour laws related to migrant labour in Panel IV. All lead presentations were followed by paper presentations.

# The Student-led National Conference on Social Justice Issues and Social Work Responses 11-12 March 2022

The Student-led National conference on Social Justice Issues and Social Work Responses was held from 11-12 March 2022 to commemorate World Social Work Day at the College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan Mumbai. At the inauguration, Dr. Lidwin presented an overview of the Institution and emphasised the mission and vision of the College which is integrated with both curricular and co-curricular programs. There is a commitment to address the issues affecting marginalized and disadvantaged groups through an integrated human rights approach. The theme of World Social Work Day, 15th March is 'Co-Building a new Eco-Social World: Leaving No One Behind' which is reflected in the theme of the National Conference. The keynote address was given by Ms Medha Patkar. Ms Medha Patkar emphasised the role of the social worker was to work for social justice and stressed how as social workers, we must have the skills, attitudes, and commitment to work for the oppressed such as those modelled by the ideals of the Constitution and social reformers such as Dr Ambedkar, and M.K Gandhi. Ms. Medha Patkar shared her experiences as an activist in the Narmada Bachao Andolan, her struggles being in jail, and the need to uphold ethics and values across a changing socio-political climate. Plenary I included two distinguished speakers on the theme Urban and Rural Poverty and Criminal Justice, Professor Vijay Raghavan, TISS Mumbai, Campus Centre for Criminology and Justice and Rights of the Tribal based on 5th and 6th Schedule of the Indian Constitution Dalit and tribal issues and social justice (Marginalisation) by Ms Sudha Bharadwaj, Vice President, India Association of People's lawyers respectively. There were a total of 22 paper presentations from students across Social Work Colleges in India. Most paper presentations were from Stella Maris, Tamil Nadu. Students represented the College of Social Work, Dr Ambedkar College Government Arts College, Rajagiri College, Loyola College of Social Sciences, University of Kerala and Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development. Plenary II on day two was led by Dr Fr, Sebastian Michael SVD, Director, Institute of Indian Culture, PG Research Centre in Society, Culture and Religion and Dr Fr. Siji Chacko SJ, Director, conference Development Office, Jesuit Conference of India/ Asia. The Valedictory Speaker was Mr. Mr. Bipin Jojo, Professor and Dean, School of Social Work, TISS. Prof Jojo reiterated the key principles of social justice: equity, access, participation, and rights. Prof Jojo shared that relevant social work interventions must focus on addressing varied forms of oppression and injustice. He congratulated students for providing a platform to discuss the emerging challenges and interventions in the promotion of social justice.

# Group Grief Intervention (November 2021 - February 2022)

The Group Grief Intervention programme was a support group created for students of Nirmala Niketan to facilitate grief/bereavement suffered due to the loss of loved ones, jobs, financial issues, or loss of any kind during the COVID-19 Pandemic. The intervention spearheaded by Dr. Smita Bammidi, was organized in collaboration with the



organization AMITA, a part of the platform PERLSS. A total of 12 sessions were conducted and on average six students took part in the sessions. The intervention depicted rapport and trust building, sharing, processing, relooking, and resolving the grief in ways unique to each individual.

#### Staff Development Programmes for Non-Teaching Staff

A session on Parenting for Non-Teaching Staff of the College on 2nd February 2022. A total of 25 people attended this workshop. It was a participatory workshop where the participants were given different scenarios in day-to-day life to discuss various parenting methods to handle the issues of children

An overnight Educational Visit to Gyanjyoti Community College, Karasgaon, Talasari was organized on 18<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup> February 2022 to provide non-teaching staff an orientation about the issues and challenges of tribal community in Karasgaon. As part of the educational visit, several sessions and field visits were conducted. These included an orientation to the Zilla Parishad School, Anvir Village; a visit to families and fields, Anvir Village; Adivasi Day Celebration; a visit to the old mission centre; input session on time management; visit to the *Warli* art unit and a session on tribal and rural communities: issues and concerns.

#### **Faculty Development Programs**

An online workshop on Pedagogy for learner's outcome-based syllabus, online and offline methods of teaching, ensuring learners' needs and monitoring and assessing learner's outcomes was organized by Internal Quality Assurance Cell, College of Social Work (Autonomous), Nirmala Niketan, Mumbai for the Faculty Members (8-9 April 2021). The Faculty Development Committee organized two workshops during the academic year. Academic Writing Workshop by Dr. Melody Kshetrimayum on 21<sup>st</sup> February 2022; Workshop on Perspective building in Tribal Social Work Practice by Fr. Sebastian Michael on 14<sup>th</sup> March 2022 and an educational visit to Gyanjyoti Community College, Karasgoan, Talasari on 18<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup> March 2022 for an orientation to Issues and Challenges- Tribal Life. The educational visit to the Gyanjyoti Community led to a meaningful and insightful dialogue between the Faculty and the Staff of the Gyanjyoti Community on the way forward for the community college and Field Action Project Spandan.

# Joint Meeting of IQAC Members, 4th January 2022

A joint meeting of twenty- three staff members including representatives from the Management of the Nirmala Niketan Institute and members from the Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the College of Social Work and College of Home Science, Degree Polytechnic and Junior was held on 4th January 2022, 2.00-4.15 p.m. at the Ground Floor Hall, College of Home Science. The main agenda of the meeting was to explore the possibilities of collaboration between the two Institutes which could range from merging common plans, programs, and schemes launched by the colleges; sharing resources and expertise; capitalizing on the strengths and expertise of the staff for common goals to propaganda for the Institute's work especially in the context of the New Education Policy. The Joint Meeting commenced with a prayer and welcome by Sr.Noella Dias and a reflection on the relevance and objective of the meeting by Dr. Magy Allesu, President, of Nirmala Niketan InstituteIn-charge Principal, Dr. Anuradha Bakshi made an insightful presentation on identifying areas of collaboration in the context of National Institute Ranking Framework (NIRF) Rankings. A detailed analysis of the NIRF report with a comparative analysis of the rank and percentage scoring in Teaching-Learning, Research, and Professional Practice, Graduation Outcomes, Outreach and Inclusivity and Perception (Employer and Academic peers' perception) of the College of Home Science and College of Social Work with top five analogous institutions was made. The introductory session was followed by a participant's reflections and suggestions for networking and collaboration. Dr. Magy Allesu concluded the meeting by highlighting a few initiatives for consideration such as interdepartmental teaching; community outreach and social entrepreneurship. There is also an urgent need to develop second and third

lines of leadership with expertise and experience. A core committee should be formed including members of both colleges by the Hon. Principals. Auxiliary teams can be formed with specific roles and responsibilities. Guidelines for collaboration need to be drafted. Sr. Noella Dias expressed her gratitude to Dr. Magy Allesu and Sr. Philomena Sequeira for the initiative for dialogue and discussion. Sr. Noella stressed that the deliberations at the meeting endorsed the immense scope for both Colleges to engage with grassroots communities, self-help groups, Bachat-gats, and marginalized sections and must be integrated with the perspective plan.

The library was started in 1958 with 2000 books. On the Golden Jubilee Year of the College (2003-2004, the library was renovated with financial aid from Aditya Birla Group. The total number of books inthe library to date is 25964; periodicals 62; Thesis and Term Paper 1541; Article indexing 27922; Newspapers Magazines/UPSC&MPSC 5; Bound Journals 3458; Special Reports 715; Conference Papers – 39; UPSC/MPSC Books – 325 and Book Bank Books – 475. The onlineresources provided by the library include Nlist Databased and 4 Sage Journals. Advanced software, various new books, and journals, a computerized database of books created, services such as reserved counters, a book bank scheme, photocopying service, interlibrary services, peer learning cubicles, and PhD room with access to computers enhanced the scope and quality of reference. From 1st April 2020 to 31st April 2021, the total number of books added to the library from 1st April 2020 to 31st March 2021 was 108. Sixtyeight books were purchased, and 40 books were donated. Article indexing 1933. The library also organizes Marathi Bhasha Diwas or Marathi Day celebrated on February 27 every year on the birth anniversary of eminent Marathi poet Vishnu Vaman Shirwad. #### **COMPUTER CENTRE**

Team: Mr. Priyadarshan Naik; Computer Instructor; Mr. Pandit (Technician); Mr Santosh Jagtap (Support Staff). Computer Centre aims to equip students with skills and knowledge in the area of information technology to enhance their performance in academics and practice. There are various services coordinated by the Computer Center. The computer lab of the College was established in 2002. Computer Courses are offered for the BSW I &II and MSW I students by the Computer Lab. Classes are conducted for these courses regularly. The Lab also offers an advanced course for the students in Graphics. There is also a course conducted in the lab for all the students in Graphics Including Computer Application for BSW II SEM III Students. The lab which is equipped with the SPSS software has also rendered its services to the research unit which uses its premises and systems for conducting SPSS courses for the MSW 2nd year and Research Methodology course students. Up-to-date and relevant software including MS Teams, Office 365, Windows 7 to Windows 11(Professional versions), and hardware and technical support. Student Computing Facilities has over 30 computers & 15 Laptops (Under the AV Unit) in an open lab setting for student use. The Lab has installed a Hathway fiber band with 50Mbps speed and has supplied the same to the entire College. Laser Printers and Multifunction devices including scanners. A large plasma screen with video inputs. Power outlets, wired and wireless network connections. Wi-Fi is available on the college campus. All the computers in the Computer Lab are under the Annual Maintenance Contract. Net Protector Endpoint Security has been installed for 3 years with AMC. All computers within UTS (Dell Sonic Firewall System) General Access Computing Facilities are regularly maintained. Computer Lab maintains a secure network with firewall protection, and authentication which is required to access wireless services.

### **AUDIO VISUAL UNIT**

The Audio-Visual Unit has reached out to many students and faculty in their teaching-learning processes and Fieldwork interventions. The Audio Visual is responsible for audio-visual facilities in lecture rooms, making video productions for educational purposes such as web lectures, infoclips, promotional films, recording of special events, conferences, and film impressions, technological support during events, and documentation of important events. Specific contributions of the AV Unit include preparing appropriate banners and posters, the layout of banners and bookmarks for special events as well as making arrangements for photography and audio-visual equipment during events such as Annual Day celebrations, Dorothy Baker's Chair

lecture, Krantiveer Savitribai Phule Lecture Series, Valedictory Function, Degree Distribution, Farewell, Sports day, SPSS workshops for the Research Unit and other fundraising and outreach events. The Unit provides photocopying, Identity card printing and formatting and layout of the Prospectus, Syllabus, Annual Reports, the Journal of 'Perspectives in Social Work', certificate of participation for value-added courses, workshops, seminars, and other important documents.

The A.V. Unit now has 868 CDs/DVD films, which are classified under Child, Movies, Women, Communal Harmony, Health, Environment, Media and Development, Education, Management, Right to Information, and General Documentation. Faculty and students have benefitted greatly by borrowing audio-visual aids from the Unit to enrich classroom teaching as well as for use in the field. There is also an increase in the use of laptops, LCD projectors, and webcams for classroom presentations.
