The conference serves as a collaborative space for peer learning, critical dialogue, intellectual exchange and the way forward for social work education and practice. Student social workers are encouraged to reflect on the application of social work theories to real-world situations through fieldwork, reflective practice, and research that enriches both academic inquiry and professional preparation.

CONCEPT NOTE

Justice Framework in Social Work Practice

Social work is a practice-based profession guided by the principles of social justice, human rights, collective responsibility, and respect for diversity. Rooted in the Person-in-Environment perspective, social work promotes holistic analysis of social issues through micro, mezzo, and macro systems.

Contemporary societal dynamics shaped by globalization, privatization, and technocratic reforms have contributed to new forms of inequality, exclusion, and oppression. These structural changes have created complex vulnerabilities and widened social gaps, especially among marginalized populations.

A Justice framework provides social workers with a lens to understand these inequities and to design ethical, context-specific, and empowerment-oriented interventions. The focus is to ensure fairness, dignity, and access to rights for all individuals, especially those disadvantaged by systemic barriers.

The National Student-Led Conference 2026 aims to bring together students of social work across India to share insights, field experiences, and research that highlight best practices emerging from a justice framework. As inequalities continue to intensify and new vulnerabilities surface, the conference becomes a platform for emerging social workers to explore alternative models, challenge structural injustices, and advocate for human dignity and social equity.


