Major activities undertaken:

The Student Council (SC): The Student Council for the academic year 2019-20 was formed according to the guidelines given by the Mumbai University Circular. The Council members were elected on 7th August 2019. The Student Council was fully functional after their Oath Taking Ceremony on 14th August 2019. Along with the curriculum and the syllabus, there are extracurricular activities conducted in the college in the banner of students council and other committees in the college. College of Social Work believes in the overall development of the students, providing them with multiple opportunities of growth and learning. Co - curricular activities bring forward the leadership skills and provides them with a learning pattern that is different from the regular classroom learning environment.

Student led National Conference: A two days National Student led Conference on the Relevance of Social Work in the Contemporary Times was organized by the MSW 2 and BSW 3 students of the institute. The conference was held on 17th and 18th of February 2020. students and practitioners from different parts of the country participated in the conference and was an enriching experience for the students and the participants. There were 17 academic papers on various topics presented in the conference. Two plenary sessions had eminent speakers with excellent field experience. Students manifested excellent leadership and organizational skills by handling the conference systematically and professionally.

Apart from the national conference there were multiple workshops and trainings that were conducted for the students. This is mentioned in the faculty section of the presentation.

Peace and Communal Harmony Cell: Peace Education course is conducted in collaboration with the Global Campus Programme of Tokyo University of Foreign Studies, Japan and in partnership with four other universities in South Asia- the Gadjah Mada University (Universitas Gadjah Mada), Indonesia, the Pannasastra University of Cambodia, the Peradeniya University, Sri Lanka, Quaid- Azam University, Islamabad, and the Islamic University of Science and Technology, Srinagar, India

Rotaract Club of College of Social work, Nirmala Niketan

A very vibrant Rotaract club functions in College of social Work Nirmala Niketan enabling the students in taking up responsibilities and conducting programmes which helps them develop their leadership skills and various other professional skills. The major events conducted by Rotaract Club; Green Campus campaign, Maha Walkathon 2019, Alert India Campaign, Seminar on Education for Street Connected Children.

Street plays and one act play on constitutional values

• Our students across classes under the leadership of Mr Sandesh and Santosh Mekale performed street play to create awareness on Constutional values on 18th august 2019 where they won the first prize in Vivek-Jagar Karandak State Level Street Play Competition. The group further participated in the one act play organized by Indian National Theatre and qualified for second round. During the academic year the group performed the one act play in nine places in Mumbai and one in Pune and received appreciation and prizes from all.

MAHA WALKATHON 2019 in collaboration with The Police Department of Government of Maharashtra took place on the 30th November from 7:30am to 9:30am. The students from CSWNN and College of Home Science, teaching and non-teaching staff of CSWNN and the with the help of the RTO officers to spread awareness on Road Safety, #No Honking, #Responsible Driving and #Responsible Living.

Women Development Cell: The Women Development cell had organized the celebration of Women's Day and Krantijyoti Savitribai Phule lecture series. The celebration was organized on 11th March 2020. A photo booth and a tattoo booth was organized for the students along with the lecture series. Dr. Manisha Gupte was invited as the Chief Guest Speaker for the lecture series. Manisha Gupte has been part of the women's movement since the mid-1970s. She has also been an activist in the health and civil rights movements in India. She co-founded MASUM, a rural women's organisation in 1987. The lecture series highlighted many important points on gender equality, intersectionality and gender justice. The speaker, in her specialized way of conveying made students understand many concepts easily, she gave simple day-to-day examples of naming systems followed by the society and patriarchal basis behind them. The lecture series left the students

with many insights and questions to further reflect on. A session on Nutrition and Wellbeing of Girls and Women was organized on 12th March 2020.

Riwayat Inter Collegiate fest: Socio-Cultural Fest of College of Social Work Nirmala Niketan was organized on 19th February 2020. The fest was organized by students in consultation with the faculty in charges of the student's council. About 19 colleges across Mumbai and suburbs participated in various events organized by the college. Venue of the programme was Extension Centre College of Social Work Nirmala Niketan, Goregaon. As the main purpose of this fest was to spread social values among youth on that basis of there were competitions like poster making, dance, street play, short film.

Student support: Our College provides various support services for students and these are:

- Interest free Educational Loan Scholarships The loan is provided for the students on an interest free basis to be paid back once they are employed in the field after their education.
- Nutritional meal: Taking care of one's own health is an important aspect while working for the people. Lunch is provided with one time meal by the college. It is made sure that the identity of the student benefitting from the scheme is kept confidential.
- Laptop Bank Understanding that all the students are not able to afford a laptop, college has started the system of laptop banks so that the students can hire a laptop from the college and continue using it till they complete their course. Students are to submit the laptops ones the course is completed. Computer experts in the computer lab provides all the possible assistance for the students in the maintenance of these laptops.
- Travel Re-imbursement: Field work agencies where we place students include rural as well as urban placements. Students often travel to interior parts of Maharashtra every week to attend their field work. Recognizing the economic expense, the students have to undergo, college provide travel reimbursement of 50% of the total travel expense of the students who are placed in rural areas for field work.

Crisis Intervention by students and staff:

On 1st July 2019, Mumbai received heavy rainfall which resulted in various disasters throughout the city. A compound wall of National Park collapsed at midnight and water flowed over huts of people who were staying below the wall in Ambedkar Nagar and Pimpripada areas of the Kurar village in Malad. There were huge loss of life (31 according to the newspaper reports) and there were many trapped under the debris. Teaching staff and students of the College of Social Work Nirmala Niketan, along with **Anubhav Mumbai college project** and **DTSS College** carried out a preliminary need assessment. It was decided to conduct a rally to raise awareness about the issues of affected people, sensitize authorities thereby and also **provide relief material** (utensils and stationary materials) to **100 affected families**. On 1st August 2019, Anubhav Mumbai in collaboration with Samyak Classes and DTSS College organised and facilitated the Malad Relief Rally in which almost 200 people had participated. The household materials as well as educational materials were distributed to almost 100 flood affected families in the area.

Training on Youth Leadership and Training Program - The three days Training was conducted on Youth Leadership and Community Development in collaboration with Nehru Yuva Kendra (NYK), Mumbai with the students of various Colleges. The objective of the training was to make youth understand the importance of Youth's Role in Governance as well the significance of Group Work and the qualities a leader should acquire.

Mumbai Suburban Youth Festival (Theme Day) Elections is a method in involving the Youth in the Democratic process and also to help them understand the skills and qualities a leader should have. It is a process to create and train the future leaders of the Country. The youth from various colleges had come to motivate and encourage the candidates and this indeed made the whole event successful.

The youth had filed 160 RTIs and more than 60 pictures on potholes, garbage, uneven roads, Traffic signals, sewage etc. These photos were posted and tagged the BMC authorities on Twitter. This Campaign was supported by Anubhav Mumbai and Student Social Workers. The campaign gave the students confidence to interact with BMC officials about the issues existing in their surroundings. In order to strengthen the campaign Anubhav Mumbai organized a Press Release and invited Adv. Nilesh Pawaskar, Criminal Prosecutor at High Court and Dr Lidwin Dias, Principal of College of Social Work (Autonomous) Nirmala Niketan. The entire campaign reports were submitted as well as a presentation was made on the same. Media was also present to cover the campaign. Some of the youth shared their experiences about the campaign. Adv. Nilesh explained in detail about the Right to Information Act and the procedure required. The entire RTI campaign was a learning

procedure to the students of getting to know one's right and ways to bring a change in the society by exercising these rights.

Field Work Programme:

The Field Work Practicum is an essential component of the Social Work curriculum and pedagogy. Social Work is viewed as a practice-oriented discipline. Students of Social Work are expected to apply the theories and concepts of the discipline while addressing problems and working with individuals, groups and communities. The overall objectives of Field Work are to develop analytical skills and critical thinking on social issues, develop an integrated approach to social work practice, and develop specific skills for intervention from an ecological framework and professional attitudes utilizing principles and values of social work.

Concurrent field work during the whole year in 53 organisations within Mumbai and rural Maharashtra Raigad, Palghar and Thane districts were organized. Field supervision is a very serious responsibility entrusted in the hands of the faculty of the college. Every faculty handles on an average 15 students under them placed in different agencies.

15 organizations have been identified throughout the country for the block placement of the MSW students. This provides an opportunity for the students to take up leadership role and have a pre-employment opportunity in various parts of the country.

The Research Unit, College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan, Mumbai was established on September 8, 1993 to promote scientific research in Social Work education and practice and develop a scientific rigor in understanding social issues that impact human lives. Strengths of the College:

- Review and planning meetings held at the end of each academic year help to strengthen the connections between the Vision, Mission of the College and the curriculum and field work practicum. The college also currently runs add on courses in social work.
- Field Action Projects (FAPs) initiated by the College in difficult issue areas or with various marginalised groups have been the strength of the College. Several FAPs initiated by the College have grown into autonomous non-profit organisations contributing to the society at large; the FAPs also serve as demonstrations for innovative interventions and as skills laboratories for the students while providing a good opportunity for students and staff to theorize on the basis of practice. This year the field action projects initiated by the college are as follows:
 - A. Rural Project: Tribal women and children of Talasari Palghar district on the malnutrition, education and livelihood areas.
 - B. Urban projects:
 - a. Field action projects are youth training to build capacity and leadership among youth from slum community.
 - b. Pravas, a project for elderly in the slum community with the goal was to form self-supporting groups of senior citizens and address their health and wholistic growth.
- The faculty members are involved in teaching, mentoring students for field work and in varied kinds of extension work in the community including officiating on several government and non –government committees and boards.
- The College has a well-established research unit to undertake commissioned research; faculty members are also encouraged to join the Unit in the research

- studies undertaken. This year five studies are undertaken by the unit. Several teachers have also taken up research under RUSA grant.
- The Management helps by raising funds for infrastructural development and for various activities of the College including educational loans for students, student activities, staff development programmes, field action projects and for appointing staff on management since the NOC is still pending by the government to appoint the staff. Field instructors are also appointed to ensure a balanced workload for the faculty members.
- The syllabus revision was undertaken with the approval of statutory bodies taking into consideration the feedback of all stakeholders and making it relevant.
- The College IQAC plays an active role in formulating qualitative strategies by collecting feedback from various stakeholders and administers Teachers Assessment Questionnaire for students to give feedback on the subjects.

Areas for development:

- Increase infrastructural facilities to organise students' activities and other simulation-based teaching exercises.
- Conduct refresher courses on various modules for alumni. Involve Alumni in college development.
- Collaborate with other state, national, and international colleges of social work, especially on academic areas and research.
