The College of Social Work Nirmala Niketan Mumbai is a premier institute established in 1955 imparting social work education in the country. It has undergraduate, post graduate certificate and degree programmes and a doctoral programme in Social Work.

The College has a history of innovation in intervention in problem situations. Sessions on low-cost nutritious food demonstrations were conducted in five different Anganwadis, where low-cost foods such as sprouted bhel, beetroot laddu, and Jaswant tonic were demonstrated for lactating and pregnant mothers through the Anganwadi centers.

There is a strong need to educate women on low-cost food preparation, as children's health can be negatively affected by the snacks and sweets they frequently consume from shops. Mothers play a crucial role in maintaining their family's health, and it is essential for them to understand that home-cooked food is the best option for their well-being.

The sessions were conducted in such a way that the women actively participated in preparing the low-cost food, allowing them to understand the process better and encouraging them to make these food items at home. The nutritional benefits of each ingredient used in the preparation were explained to the women.

After the food was prepared, the women and their children were given samples to taste, helping them decide whether they would prepare these dishes at home. It was observed that some women recognized the importance of home-cooked food and made efforts to cook nutritious meals for their families. However, others did not prioritize healthy eating, as they were occupied with other tasks and typically prepared only basic meals, such as dal and rice, three times a day.

Despite this, all the women acknowledged that their children frequently consumed sweets, wafers, and snacks from shops, which are often oily and unhealthy.

Spandan has conducted sessions on various topics in 17 different Anganwadis for pregnant, lactating, and other women. The topics were selected based on the needs of the women and included stress management, health, hygiene and nutrition, child marriage and girls' education, human body parts, and holistic health. Most women actively participate in the sessions, as they are conducted in the local language. They listen attentively and engage with the discussions. Some women feel shy in the beginning, but as more sessions are conducted, they become more comfortable and start expressing their thoughts. The women are happy to learn new things and enjoy the icebreaker activities, as they are often occupied with household work and rarely get opportunities to step out. Topics like stress management have been particularly effective, as many women experience stress in their daily lives but have never openly discussed it or heard others talk about it, assuming it to be a normal part of life.

Overall, the sessions have positively impacted the women in various ways.

Spandan staff has conducted sessions in different schools on various topics like health and hygiene, self-awareness and self-confidence, child marriage and girls' education, skill development, POCSO Act, adolescent wellbeing, and mental health. 16 sessions were conducted in different schools for the adolescent children. The children are actively involved in the session and they are always excited for the sessions as it is something new for them than the syllabus. Through the topics they get to learn a lot as the school teachers no not talk to them on these topics, the students can relate to the sessions as live examples are shared with them during the sessions. It has been observed by the Spandan team that in the beginning the students feel very shy and do not talk or answer the questions when asked but after more interaction with them through the session then start talking and expressing their feelings

Thirteen Sessions were conducted by the NN Field work students in different schools on various topics like child marriage and education, POCSO Act, human rights, self-awareness, and self-confidence. It is a learning process for both the NN students and the other students on the various topics. The NN students also enacted a skit on the session topics which made the students more involved in the topics and helped them understand the topics better which they were able to relate to their life.

A session on career guidance was organized by the Spandan team along with NN fieldwork students. So far, three sessions have been conducted for different groups of students, with a total of 407 participants.

This session was particularly important, as many students are uncertain about their future after completing their 11th and 12th grades. The session helped them gain knowledge about various career options and make informed decisions.

Most students are highly confused about their future and have no clear career goals. Their parents are often unable to guide them due to a lack of information. These sessions play a crucial role in bridging this gap by providing students with valuable career-related insights and guidance.

## Sahyogi Project

The Sahyogi Project was initiated to assist in the Rehabilitation Process of the Persons with Disability.



#### SAHYOGI PROJECT

Under Project Shayogi, eight sessions have been conducted by Spandan in collaboration with other organizations. These sessions and training programs are designed for PLV members and persons with disabilities.

Six sessions were conducted for PLV members, equipping them with knowledge on various topics so they can share this information within their communities and carry out related activities. Since many people in the community have limited education, understanding legal matters can be challenging for them. To address this, PLVs were trained to guide and support community members in legal issues.

A session was also conducted for persons with disabilities, where they were informed about various government schemes available to them. Their rights were explained through a skit, making the session more engaging and accessible. Additionally, discussions were held on the need for further interventions to support persons with disabilities.

Furthermore, a session on the POSH Act and POCSO Act was conducted in collaboration with Dahanu Court and Savane Ashram School. Advocates educated the teachers of Savane Ashram School on these laws. Given the existing concerns, it was deemed necessary to first educate the teachers so they could, in turn, inform their students about these important issues.

#### College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan Spandan (Field Action Project) Sahyogi Meeting

Date: 26th Nov 2024

Venue: Dhamagaon Zadipada Community centre

The session for the Sahyogi members was organized at the community centre in Dhamangaon Zadipada on the rights of the persons with disability and the schemes available for the persons with disability. The 16 participants participated in the session among these there were people with the locomotor disability, hearing disability and mentally disability. The Field work students, Spandan staff, Dr. Anita Machado, Sr.Clara and the Spandan staff were present for the session. The registration and the snacks distributed to the participants. The session began with the introduction and objectives of the session. A skit on the facilities and right of the persons with disability was put up by the NN field work students which explained the rights of the persons with disability and the special facilities that should be available for the persons with disability at hospitals, schools, work officers and in the community. The skit also highlighted the struggles the person with disability might be going through, the participants could relate to the skit very well and watched it very carefully and eagerly. At the end of the skit some participants also expressed how they feel low in the community because of their disability.

The students also displayed a placard indicating each right read out the right loudly and explained the rights of the persons with disability.

The various schemes that and government trainings that are available for the community people were introduced to the participants. the training programs and schemes of khadi gram, District Industries Services, and the schemes from Project office to start an entrepreneur were introduced to them.

Interacted with the members regarding the various kinds of assistance that they may need. Many of the participant needed assistance for the documentation like caste certificate and disability certificate.

The Spandan team then discussed about the future interventions with the 4 young children Kiran, Karan, Anjali and Pratik who could not go to school because of their disability. The information on the farmers market was shared with them so that they can be prepared for the market.

Was initiated to provide alternate livelihood options for the community youth and families by providing training in different skills such as Coconut Shell Artefacts, Bamboo Products, Herbal Medicine preparation and other Value added Products



Spandan, in collaboration with expert trainers, organized hands-on training sessions on block printing and sewing at Gnanjyoti Community College to equip participants with practical skills in textile designing and tailoring. On 20th July 2024, a block printing workshop was conducted for 35 participants by Mr. Masoom and his colleague. The session began with an introduction to the trainers and their work, followed by an overview of block printing, including its history, significance, equipment, materials, and process. A live demonstration was conducted, and participants practiced the technique by creating their own block-printed tote bags. Subsequently, a three-day block printing and sewing training session was held from 23rd to 25th September 2024, with 20 participants. On the first day, participants were introduced to the basics of sewing, including raw materials and stitching techniques, followed by demonstrations on stitching a laptop bag and a pillow cover. The second day focused on advanced sewing techniques, where participants learned to stitch a folding bag and a kurta. On the third day, a O&A session was conducted to address queries related to sewing, and each participant successfully completed stitching at least one item. The session also included an introduction to block printing, followed by a demonstration and hands-on practice. The training sessions were highly interactive and provided participants with valuable practical skills, enhancing their confidence and ability to create textile products. The initiative was well-received, with participants expressing enthusiasm to apply their newly acquired skills, thereby promoting self-sufficiency and potential entrepreneurial opportunities.

#### MODEL GARDEN GCC

The two model kitchen gardens at Gnanjyoti Community College are managed by the Spandan team in collaboration with the garden worker and GCC hostel girls. These vegetable gardens were established to ensure that hostel girls have access to fresh, homegrown vegetables, reducing their dependency on purchasing vegetables from outside. The Spandan team provided seeds and guided the gardener in sowing various vegetable seeds, including palak, methi, bottle gourd, ridge gourd, sponge gourd, laal math, radish, tomato, brinjal, and ladyfinger. Once the vegetables are ready for harvest, the hostel girls collect them and use them in their daily meals. The initiative has been highly beneficial as it not only provides fresh, organic produce but also promotes self-sufficiency and healthy eating among the students. Additionally, the absence of chemical fertilizers ensures that the vegetables are natural and nutritious, further enhancing the well-being of the hostel girls

#### Details on Parasbaug Training Conducted by the Staff and Students Placed in Spandan

A total of 1,135 seed packets were received, out of which 838 packets were distributed across 18 different villages, 5 schools, and 1 Anganwadi. The remaining 297 seed packets are in stock. Follow-up visits were conducted with 187 families who had sown the seeds. However, some community members have not yet sown the seeds as they migrate for brick kiln work and have expressed their intention to plant them later. The Spandan team encouraged them to sow at least a few seeds to benefit from the initiative. Feedback from some families indicated that while they had sown the seeds, the crops were either eaten by animals or damaged due to heavy rains. On the other hand, those who successfully cultivated the seeds have grown vegetables well and are incorporating them into their daily meals. They have greatly benefited from the seeds provided by Spandan, enhancing their food security and nutrition.

#### Details on Parasbaug Training Conducted by the Staff and Students Placed in Spandan

As part of a comprehensive effort to improve the nutritional health of underweight children, Spandan has been actively providing nutritional support through the distribution of essential pulses and legumes. A total of 250 grams each of moong, Kabuli chana, black chana, and peanuts were distributed to identified children on a monthly basis. This initiative has been consistently implemented from May to December 2024, reaching numerous children in need.

The distribution process ensures that underweight children receive vital nutrients that contribute to their overall health and well-being. A total of 570 packets of nutrition pulses were received, out of which 563 were distributed to children across various locations, with the remaining 7 packets utilized for demonstration sessions in different villages, including Kawada, Kondharpada, Dhamatne Dukanpada, Ambessary, and Getipada.

The follow-up process with families revealed that many children have shown improvements in their dietary habits, with parents acknowledging the benefits of incorporating these protein-rich foods into their daily meals. However, challenges such as seasonal disruptions and accessibility issues were noted, and efforts were made to ensure that every child received their allocated nutritional support.

This initiative has played a significant role in addressing malnutrition among underweight children by providing them with essential nutrients in a sustainable manner. Through continued efforts, awareness, and follow-up sessions, the program aims to create a lasting impact on child nutrition and health.

#### **FARMERS MARKET**

A Farmers' Market was organized by Spandan and the College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan, on 20th December 2024 for the community members from Dahanu and Talasari. The event saw participation from 14 community members and 12 members from GCC Karajgaon, including Sahyogi members and PLV members of Spandan.

Various products, such as organic vegetables, Warli paintings, Warli art fabric materials, spices, dry fish, chikoo-based products, eggs, and honey, were displayed and sold at the market. Spandan also set up a stall to sell eggs and honey. Additionally, a food stall was set up where rice chapati with chutney was served to consumers.

Apart from the farmers and artisans from Talasari and Dahanu, a team from TRIFED also participated in the event. A live Warli painting demonstration was organized right in front of the college, accompanied by posters displaying information about the Warli tradition.

The farmers and artisans set up their stalls in the morning, and soon after, consumers—comprising college students, faculty, and people from the neighborhood offices—began visiting the stalls to explore and purchase products. The farmers actively engaged with customers, providing information about their products and explaining how the vegetables were grown. As the produce was organic, customers were eager to buy them.

There was a particularly high demand for country eggs and honey sold by Spandan. The attractive packaging of honey drew customers' attention, and many appreciated its presentation. Similarly, the country eggs, packaged in an appealing manner, were well received. For products like honey, chikoo chips, and chikoo pickle, samples were offered for tasting, allowing customers to try the products before purchasing.

Participants were encouraged to visit each stall to observe and learn about product display, packaging, and marketing strategies. The Farmers' Market was an enriching experience for all participants, allowing them to earn from their home-based products while gaining knowledge and confidence. The event also provided insights into different market opportunities where they could set up their stalls in the future.

A 3-hour session on marketing was conducted by Spandan, a Field Action Project of College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan, on 22nd January 2025, at the Dhamangaon Community Centre. The session aimed to help participants understand various aspects of marketing and improve the way farmers market their products. The need for this session arose after the Farmers' Market at Nirmala Niketan College, where it became evident that the farmers needed guidance in better marketing their products. A total of 28 participants attended the session.

The session began with an introduction to marketing, where participants were made aware of its fundamental concepts. The different types of markets they had observed were also discussed. It was emphasized that before marketing a product, its key attributes must be decided. Information was shared about various products available within the community, which could be considered for sale, such as honey, spices, eggs, vegetables, Warli art, and pulses.

Participants were introduced to important aspects of marketing, including the production and process of the product, packaging, pricing, branding, labeling, and ensuring product purity.


To demonstrate product purity, a honey purity test was conducted. Two cups of water were used: in one cup, pure honey was added, and in the other, adulterated honey was mixed. The difference between the two was evident—when adulterated honey was added, it immediately mixed with the water, while pure honey remained separate from the water. Participants observed this test and were informed that every product marketed as organic must be pure and unadulterated.

The session proved to be informative, providing valuable insights into effective marketing practices for community products.

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#### College of Social Work, Nirmala Niketan Spandan (Field Action Project) **Block Printing training**

Date: 20th July 2024

Venue: Gnanjyoti Community College, Karajgaon Patilpada.

A training on block printing was organized by the Spandan and Gnanjyoti Community College on the 20<sup>th</sup> July 2024. Mr. Masoom was the resource person to train the members. He is involved in the professional block printing work and conducts many workshops and training programs.

The training started with a brief introduction about the project Spandan, the GCC College. Them the trainer for the block printing session was introduced to the participants. A total of 35 participants were present for the session. Once all the blocks were displayed the participants were asked to check the various types of blocks by touching them to understand the different designs like the Warli art design, the flower design, the tarpa dance, various border designs and the Nirmala Niketan college logo was also made and printed on the cloth.

Mr. Masoom then introduced the various blocks use for the block printing. The blocks called the Budda block - Big block, Boarder block - for boarder and vegetable blocks are the various blocks used for block printing work. The blocks are prepared from wood and some from the metal. Mostly it is better to use the wooden blocks as they do not spoil easily.

The pigment colour is used for the block print. The trainer used the red and the green colour for the training.


The first process of block printing is making the colours. For making the colour for block printing it is needed that various pieces of fabrics be used for mixing the paint. The cloths called Bhabli- thick cloth, Green jali – thin cloth, red colour thin cloth are the different types of cloths used depending on the type of block printing that one needs to do.

When the red and the green colours were ready Mr. Masoon demonstrated the Budda block printing. All the participants were asked to try the block printing with different blocks. After the Budda block printing the border blocks were used for the printing. First the trainers demonstrated the border blocks where the blocks are needed to deep slightly in the colour and put it on the cloth and them bang hard on the block and then the block needs to be removed by pressing one hand onto the cloth to avoid the colour from spreading. All the participants were them asked to try making the border print. After which a mix of two different blocks called the double printing was demonstrated to the participants. All the participants were then asked to practice doing all the blocks.

Once the practice session was over each participant was given a tote bag for themselves on which they had to make their own designs with the Nirmala Niketan college logo on one side. Each participant printed their own designs. The trainer Mr. Masoom informed the participants that it takes about one hour for the printed cloth to dry up.

The participants were very happy to learn new skills. It was observed that some participants were very artistic and were very interested to keep doing the block printing if they got the chance to do. The Spandan team and the GCC team will continue to encourage the participants to practice block printing and to get the orders so the participants can earn through the block printing work.

Date: 23<sup>rd</sup>, 24<sup>th</sup>, 25<sup>th</sup> September- 2024

Venue: Gnanjyoti Community College, Karajgaon Patilpada.

A three-day training on Basic sewing and block printing was held on the 23, 24, 25 September 2024 at Gnanjyoti Community College, Karajgaon. At total of 20 women participated for the training. The training was organized in collaboration with the GCC. A resource person Ms. Nisha was invited for the training.

The first day of the training on 23rd September was began at 2.00pm with the introduction of the Spandan and the GCC followed by the welcome of all the participants and the resource person by the Spandan team. The objectives of the training were introduced to the participants. Ms. Nisha was introduced to the participants who is an employee at GCC in the production unit who has a good experience in the sewing department. The women where then asked to introduce themselves.

Then Ms. Nisha started the training by giving the basic information of the sewing and the various products that can be stitched for block printing like the kurta, laptop bag, shopping bag, sling bag, folding bag, purse, pouch, pillow cover, pillow etc and showed them the sticked products to check and observe. She then showed the samples of the cloth items that were going to be taught in a three-day training the laptop bag, kurta, folding bag, pillow cover. She also gave information on the different raw materials that will be required for sewing.

On the first day a laptop bag and a pillow cover were taught to the participants. The trainer first showed the measurement and cutting of the cloth and then sowed them the sticking on the sewing machine. The participants observed the trainer till the products were completely ready.

On the second day a folding bag and the kurta were taught to the participants. The participants very closely observed the sessions and made notes as they will be sewing the products by themselves after the training.

On the third day of the training the participants were asked to stich any one of the products that they have learnt in the past two days with the assistance of the trainer. The participants with the help of the notes of the measurement they cut the cloth according to the items they wanted to stich. They then sticked different products out of the different cloths. 3 participants stitched the pillow cover, 3 participants stitched the kurta, 5 of them stitched the laptop bags and stitched folding bags.

After the participants had completed stitching their products a session for the block printing had begun. Ms. Neeta gave the information on the colour and other raw materials required for the block painting. A mixing of colour was demonstrated to them followed by the demonstration of the block printing on the cloth. Three colours the white, black, and brown were used for the block printing. After which each participant was asked to try doing the block printing on the cloth. After the participants had practiced enough each one did the block printing on the products that they had made themselves. A three-day session ended with the vote of thanks for the trainer and the participants and requesting them to continue

making the products at home.

It was observed that the women were very happy, motivated, and enthusiastic to learn the new art specially of the block printing and that they would continue making such products for sale out of which they can make a livelihood.



He also mentioned that no any outsider can take away or buy the land of the tribal people. True this Ayog we can make any complain that we have a problem with. He also explained about the Atrocity act where if any offences are done against a tribal person the offender can be jailed for 7 to 10 years. He spoke about the customary law as in the current situation a lot of people are facing the issue of getting into fight because the married women of the house are demanding for the father's land. As in Palghar district these are the major issues related to land specially since the bullet train and super highway project have started their work and occupying people's lands. He took the people questioned as people had some personal issues related to land.

Viraj sir also spoke about the various schemes available for the Adivasi people. Specially for the windows and the old age people. The session was ended by the questions from the participants which were answered by the advocate sir. He also asked the persons to meet him individually if they needed any legal guidance.

After the resource persons session, the presentation on the forest vegetables was held for the participants a to celebrate the indigenous day which is on the 9<sup>th</sup> of Aug. It was to understand the need of maintaining our Warli culture and preserve our nature and the forest and to understand the importance of forest vegetables.

The presentation was done by the three people along with the samples of the vegetables. First a women names Jayanti came forward to present her vegetables where she had got 5 forest vegetables. She gave in detail information about the names, the source, the importance, the benefits, and the various recipes that can be made from these vegetables. After which two more men participated and gave similar information on the commonly found forest vegetable. They were given the prizes as a token of appreciation.

All the participants were thanked for their presence after they were given a brief of the PLV training and about our monthly meeting in the different communities where a resource person from the Dahanu course will be guiding us on the different topics and that all the participants will be expected to be present for theses meetings. The resource person was given a gift as a token of thanks.

The meeting had ended by serving food to all the participants.

It was observed that people did need this session in the area as lot of people had problems related to land and land documents. Participants were active during the session and did follow the session and the advocate new the problems of the community very well and spoke keeping that in mind.

A meeting on the 6<sup>th</sup> of July 2024 was held at the Gnanjyoti Communilty College in Karajgaon Patilpada. This meeting was organised and coordinated by the Spandan-Field Action project of College of Social Work Nirmala Niketan and Gnanjyoti Community college in collaboration with Taluka Legal Services Committee Dahanu- Talasari. This program was the part of the PLV training that had been held in the month of April 2024. It was a third meeting with the PLV members and the other interested members. A total of 63 participants participated in the program. The guest speakers for the program were the Advocate Shailesh Kalangada from Dahanu Court and Assistant Police Inspector Hemant Devare from Talasari Police station. The topic for the program were the Girls Education and Child marriage.

The program began by welcoming all the participants and the guest speakers Adv. Kalangada and API Davare. The lighting of the lamp was done with a message to spread the knowledge and wisdom to all our brothers and sisters. The guest speakers were welcomed with the flower bouquet. The brief introduction and objective about the program were given to the participants.

Since the community Dahanu and Talasari has large number of marriages taking place of the girls and boy under the age of 18 and 21 this session was important for the PLV members and the other participants. on one side may girls are getting educated and pursuing higher education there is another side to it where girls are not so educated. The girls are helpless and leave their studies half way and go for labour work or get married. Hence it was important that these issues were addressed by the Advocate and the API.

The Advocate Kalangada spoke about the various issues that exist in our community and the need for us to resolve these issues one by one, little by little. Issues such as the child marriage, girls' education, water issues, employment issues, malnutrition, and others. He specifically spoke that each one of us responsible in a child marriage is happening within our community and that we should take immediate action. In cases where the parents are not aware about the law related to child marriage, we as PLV members should take the responsibility to explain the

child marriage is a crime. Child marriage leads to pregnancy and early pregnancy and early child birth can lead to complication during the delivery of the baby or the child can also be born as underweight. Some of the government scheme for the women were introduced.

API Hemant Devare the addressed the issues of the child marriage, girls' education, and sati pratha. He spoke about the famous women who have struggled and have become successful in their own way. He gave the example of Savitribai Phule, Kalpana Chawla. He motivated the female participants to be independent.

There are many laws specially for the tribal people but the people need to take these issues to the right places to the right departments only them our problem will be solve only then we will get what we want. Many of the people go to the wrong places for their problem which won't help. He also gave a brief information on the police system and about the cognizable and non-cognizable offences. Sir was happy to be part of the program and that he would like to stay connected to this group and would come for the other programs taking place through GCC and Spandan.

Dr. Anita Machado suggested to Adv. Kalangada and API Devare that the GCC and Spandan can work in collaboration with the Talasari Police department and the Dahanu court to do these awareness programs and other work.

A Para Legal Volunteers certificates were distributed of the training for the training held on the 24<sup>th</sup>, 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> April 2024. The certificates were handed over to the participants by the API and the Advocate.

Ms. Neeta the brief about the PLV training held and the importance of this training and that each person who has been awarded with the certificate will be working closely with the court and the police department for works related to social work. The participants were once again reminded of their roles and the responsibilities as a PLV members, which are as follows

- 1. Identifying the underweight children in our community.
- 2. Identifying the persons with disability in our community
- 3. Conducting monthly session in our community on the topics that were address during this PLV program.
- 4. Identifying and making a list of the people who need to get various documents.
- 5. Identify person within your community for block printing training organized on the 20<sup>th</sup> of July 2024.

A skit of child marriage and girls' education was put up the GCC girls which gave a message about the girl's education, and the consequences that the one has to face due to early marriage and early pregnancy. A beautiful message was sent through the skit to the audiences.

Sr. Clera them thanks all the participants for being a part of the program and that they must have gained some knowledge from this program and specially thanked the guest speakers Adv. Kalangada and API Hemant Devare.

The members were informed about our collaboration with the Dahanu court that we will be arranging a program every month on the first Saturday on the various topics according to the

courts calender. The participants were intimated about the next month's meeting on the  $3^{rd}$  of August on the World Tribal day.

The participants dispersed from the venue after having snacks

A meeting for the PLV members and other members was held on the 14<sup>th</sup> Nov 2024. The major topics for the session were the 1. Schemes and training programs at Khadi gram and the Lok Adalat in Dahanu court. The resource person Mr. Kaushik from Khadi gram udyog, Dahanu and Adv. Vinod More and Adv. Kiran Bhonar from Dahanu court, the NN FW students, the NN professor Dr. Anita Machado, the GCC students and Sisters, the Spandan team, PLV members and other participants participated in the session. The session was held in GCC.

After the snacks and tea was serves to all the participants, the session began by welcoming all the participants. A Total of 64 participants participated for the session. Out of them the 17 were the PLV members.

The session began with lighting the lamp with the prayer. The objectives and structure for the session were introduced to the participants after giving a brief about the PLV training held in the April 2024. The objectives for the session were as follows.

- 1. Introduction to the schemes and training program through Khadi gram.
- 2. Introduction to Lok Adalat.
- 3. Role and responsibilities of the PLV members to arrange for the session in the community and the school.

- 4. Types of Lok Adalat. National Lok Adalat and State Lok Adalat
- 5. The kinds of cases that can be brought to the Lok Adalat with the help of the examples.
- 6. The benefits of the Lok Adalat.

Throughout the session the participants asked few questions to the Adv. Vinod More and clarified their doubt.

Mr. Akhil Kaushik the project coordinator of the Khadi gram Udyog then took over the session. He started with his introduction following with the history of the Khadi gram udyog. He introduced a lot of training program like warli painting, carpentary, makeup, jaggery making, garment making, tie and dye, candle making, pickele making, masala making, perfume making, bee keeping, bee box making, bamboo art and craft, coconut leaf art and craft etc. some of these training are free, some fee based and others were the stipendary training courses. He also gave an information on the loan scheme available through their organization and how the organization helps the people for the marketing of the products.

Mr. Kaushik informed the participants the benefits of theses training programs and the need to get these training to start off something on our own through which the people can earn their livelihood. The participants then asked a lot of question like when the courses are starting and the venue for these session and other which were answered by the resource person.

Mrs. Neeta then once again remineded the members their roles and responsibilities towards their community and think about how they can work with the Spandan team. Dr. Anita also motivated and requested the paticipants for their active involvements with the community and the Spandan team.


The certificates for the training by Khadi gram Udyog to the GCC students were distributed.

A session was organised by the Spandan team in Collaboration with the TLSC Dahanu- Talasari and Government Ashram School Savane. The session has held for the teachers of the school on the topics Session on Scheme for Protection and Implementation of Tribal Rights, POCSO Act-2012 and POSH Act on the 19<sup>th</sup> September 2024. The resource persons Adv. Anil Lilka from Kawada and

Adv. Shailesh Kalangada from Ambessari were invited as the resource persons for the session. 21 participants were participated for the session.

The session began with a worm welcome of the resource persons and the participants. After the introduction of the project Spandan and TLSC Dahanu- Talasari the objectives of the session were informed to the participants. The introduction of the Advocates was given by the Spandan team. The resources persons were them requested to take the session further.

Adv. Anil Lilka then gave information on the topic Scheme for Protection and Implementation of Tribal Rights where he highlighted about the PESA Act and its importance for the tribal people. He gave information on the various government schemes that are available for the tribal people and the difficulties that the tribal people face to avail these schemes. Adv. Anil gave information about the NASLSA, DALSA and TALSA and its function.

Adv. Shailesh Kalangda conducted a session on the POCSO act and the POSH act. He explained about the what POCSO act 2012 is its functions, the categories of the sexual offences and the punishment under the act. He highlighted some of the issues in the community which were filed under the POCSO act for the better understanding of the teachers. The teachers asked questions related to the topic from their experiences to get the right solutions for such situation specially in the school from the advocates. Adv. Shailesh gave information on the POSH act for the teachers. That the act is important specially for female teachers at work place. And requested to all the teachers to be sensitive and attentive towards these issues of signs in the children.

Teachers asked questions predicting the cases that they might face with their school children related to the act to which the advocates answered. The teachers also requested to conduct such sessions with the school children as this information in going to be very useful for them.

The session ended with the vote of thanks to the resource persons and the teachers for participating in the session.
